Town Meeting Warrant

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Monroe in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the School House Auditorium in said Monroe on Tuesday, the tenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see how much money the town will raise for Memorial purposes and other celebrations.

4. To see how much money the town will raise for care of Cemeteries.

5. To see how much money the town will raise for electric lights in town.

6. To see what action the town will take in regard to raising money for the purpose of keeping a physician in town.

7. To see how much money the town will raise for building and maintaining highways and bridges.

8. To see how much money the town will raise for Libraries more than the law requires.

9. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of the class II road known as the Connec-

ticut River Road, the state will contribute \$3,399.75 providing the town will raise \$4,533.00. If class V assistance is desired the town must raise \$143.29 and the state will contribute \$573.16.

10. To see how much money the town will raise for the support of a band in town.

11. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through tax collector's deeds.

12. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the Arthur Metcalf real estate.

13. To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to provide a room in an approved hospital for the free use of citizens in need of hospital care.

14. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to raise money on town notes if necessary.

15. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they appraise the property to be taxed.

16. To see what action the town will take in regard to putting in a water system for fire protection, and pass any vote relating thereto.

17. To bring in your votes for delegates-at-large, alternate delegates-at-large, delegates and alternate delegates, to the National Conventions of the various political parties to be held to nominate party candidates for President and Vice-president of the United States.

18. To see what action the town will take in regard to appropriating a sum of money to be used to purchase sick room supplies to be kept as a commun-

ity chest and loaned in case of need, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

19. To see what action the town will take in regard to building a new town hall, and pass any vote relating thereto.

20. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to lay a road to the new Martha English house.

21. To see what action the town will take in regard to sewer extension in the village.

22. To see if the town will make an appropriation sufficient for the erection of a ski jump.

23. To see if the town will vote to adopt the secret ballot for the election of town officers.

24. To hear reports of town officers and pass any vote relating thereto.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Over 1,200 yards of gravel have been used on class V roads the past year. Many narrow places have been reconstructed to a width of 18 feet. Over 400 yards have been used and 500 feet of new railing put up on dangerous embankments to clear the law.

Monroe has a modern town garage for all highway equipment, equipped with a modern heating system.

A new system has been introduced for checking tools used by each laborer to prevent loss of same.

All equipment is checked each week to insure first class condition at all times. The highway department has purchased a new Farquar steam boiler for thawing purposes.

The town of Monroe needs 2,000 feet of snow fence for class V roads.

In connection with last year's record, I should like to call your attention to the per cent of attendance, 96.73. This is over two per cent higher than that of the whole state which was 94.66. The low number of tardy marks is unusual and especially commendable. This also is much better than the state average. The fine transportation facilities, the well kept building, the hot lunches, the health supervision, and the dental clinics all contribute to the welfare of the children and help in the matter of attendance.

As the intellectual and cultural center of the life of the young people, it seems most fortunate that the school is able to offer so much in music and reading. The additions to the school library, which are being made this winter, benefit the pupils and help the town library by taking care of much of the juvenile material. If the school owned a radio and motion picture machine, it could make use of many of the instructive and interesting broadcasts and films now available.

The extra curricula activities of the pupils do not seem to lessen their ability to do good school work. Personal observation, the results of standard tests, and the records made by Monroe pupils in the high school lead to this conclusion.
