

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

**To the Inhabitants of the Town of Monroe in the
County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in
Town Affairs:**

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Monroe on Tuesday, the ninth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see how much money the town will appropriate for the Town Hall and other town buildings.
4. To see what action the Town will take relative to the reconstruction or replacement of the highway bridge across the Connecticut River in the highway leading from North Monroe to Barnet, Vermont, and payment for the same.
5. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for the Fire Department.
6. To see how much money the Town will raise for Blister Rust Control.
7. To see what action the Town will take on raising money for the purpose of keeping a physician in town.
8. To see how much money the Town will raise to maintain the sewers.

9. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for Town Maintenance on roads.

10. To see how much money the Town will raise for street lighting.

11. To see how much money the Town will raise for Libraries more than the law requires.

12. To see how much money the town will raise for support of the poor.

13. To see how much money the town will raise for old age assistance.

14. To see how much money the town will raise for Memorial Day and other celebrations.

15. To see how much money the town will raise for Parks and Playgrounds including Band Concerts.

16. To see how much money the town will raise for Cemeteries.

17. To see if the town will vote to raise the required amount to pay the interest on indebtedness.

18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum sufficient to accept State Aid Construction.

19. To see how much money the town will appropriate for sewer construction.

20. To raise and appropriate a sufficient amount to meet the indebtedness due January 1, 1938.

21. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to raise money on Town notes if necessary.

22. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the Inventory Blanks at the time they appraise the property to be taxed.

23. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collector's deeds.

24. To hear reports of town officers and pass any vote relating thereto.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

26. Is it expedient to revise the Constitution of the State of New Hampshire.

27. To see if the town will vote to accept State Aid on Bridges.

Eight hundred feet of snow fence was purchased in 1936.

Three-fourths of a mile of Class V roads was reconstructed to eighteen feet wide. Many obstacles such as stumps, rocks and trees were removed to aid in operating the snow-plow.

The maintenance cost of a good wide road is much less than that of a narrow road. In maintaining a narrow road the same process has to be repeated each year, thus, from year to year having nothing to show

for the money expended. Therefore, to cut down maintenance costs wider roads should be constructed.

The Hunt Mountain road needs special attention this coming year. Culverts could be installed in place of the numerous water bars, with little expense.

We hope that the book bags that we tried to distribute to each family that borrows books from the libraries, proved useful to you. The librarian thinks it would be nice if the library owned a mimeograph. She would then be able to keep the families of the town informed as to new books, etc.

Again the percent of attendance for last year was higher than the state average of 94.75, while the tardiness per pupil was only about one-fifth of the average. State rules require the marking of children tardy if the school bus, by which they come, is late. The fact that our bus was not late once last year nor during the past five years has made possible such a fine record.

While the registers did not record any formal visits by members of the board, the building was actually visited almost every day during the school year. The Monroe Board was probably in closer touch with the school than almost any other board in the state.

The pupils continue to receive pleasure and benefit through a number of different activities. Both boys and girls have basketball teams which are playing a schedule of about a dozen games this year. The boys have a baseball nine which plays teams from East Rye-gate, McIndoes, and other neighboring towns. The girls enjoy softball contests between different classes and groups.

In addition to athletic sports, the school sponsors entertainments and exercises in which the children take part. About once a week are shown motion pictures which supplement the work in geography, science, history and other school subjects. Recently

there has been organized under the leadership of Miss Bedell a music club having as its object the study of the lives of great composers and the appreciation of their compositions. The band continues to make a good showing both at home and when away with other school bands at music festivals.

As a result of the finding of large scale experiments made in other school systems, it seemed advisable to install some typewriters in the primary grades. Typing their exercises seems to aid children in the formation of correct word images. It also helps their spelling, and stimulates more original and better composition.

Continuing the custom of other years a dental clinic was held last year and a large number of the children treated. While the expenditure of school money is restricted by the state regulations to inspection only, there is no doubt that treatment is much more valuable. It is to be hoped, therefore, that town and private funds may continue to make these clinics possible.
