



Town Meeting Warrant

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Monroe in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Monroe on Tuesday, the 10th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see how much money the town will raise and appropriate for the town hall and other town buildings.

4. To see how much money the town will raise and appropriate for the fire department.

5. To see what action the town will take on raising money for the purpose of keeping a physician in town.

6. To see how much money the town will appropriate for the maintenance of sewers.

7. To see how much money the town will appropriate for town road maintenance.

8. To see how much money the town will raise for street lighting.

9. To see how much money the town will raise for libraries more than the law requires.

10. To see how much money the town will raise for the support of the poor.

11. To see how much money the town will raise for old age assistance.

12. To see how much money the town will raise for Memorial Day.

13. To see how much money the town will raise for parks and playgrounds including band concerts.

14. To see how much money the town will raise for cemeteries.

15. To see if the town will vote to raise the required amount to pay the interest and indebtedness due 1942.

16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum sufficient to accept State Aid construction.

17. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they appraise the property to be taxed.

18. To see what action the town will take in regard to real estate taken over for non-payment of taxes.

19. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to raise money on town notes if necessary.

20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$907.00 to the White Mountains Region Association, being 1/100th of one percent of the town valuation, for the purpose of issuing and distributing printed matter, newspaper and magazine advertising, and otherwise calling attention to the resources and advantages of the town, in cooperation with the other 45 towns in the White Mountains Region.

21. To see if the voters of the town will vote to make the following changes in the Monroe Zoning Ordinances:—1. Amend ARTICLE 2. Section 1, to read as follows: No land in zones A, B and C shall be used for a dump, or place of refuse, waste or junk of any kind; nor for the storage of abandoned automobiles, carriages or other vehicles, machinery or other tools or appliances; nor for signs other than for advertis-

ing the premises thereon, or the owners or occupants thereof, and no land in these zones shall be used in a manner that is disorderly, unsightly, noxious, offensive or detrimental to the public, or the owners or occupants of adjacent property; or prejudicial to the general welfare of the community, without the approval in writing of the zoning board, upon such conditions as they may determine are necessary to protect the interests of adjoining property and of the community as a whole. 2. Omit ARTICLE 2. Section 11. And to raise a sum of money sufficient to have any changes printed; as well as voting for one member of the Zoning Board for a period of three years, and one member for the Board of Adjustment for a period of five years.

22. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen to dispose of the Ski Jump.

23. To see if the town will raise the sum of \$400.00 to control White Pine Blister Rust.

24. To hear reports of all committees and officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Taking advantage of their many opportunities the pupils have continued to participate in many extra-curricula activities with excellent results. The pupils taking piano lessons have given several recitals. The choir has sung at some of these recitals, taken part in numerous school exercises, and sung in the Easter service at the Methodist church in Woodsville. The

band has attended both the New England and New Hampshire festivals and furnished a series of summer concerts.

The boys of the manual training classes have improved the shop by building a storage cupboard for tools and a dust-proof room for painting. In their various classes the girls have been doing a high grade of work in sewing and cooking. In June, when the standard achievement tests were given to all the elementary pupils of my seven districts, the highest scores in grades three and eight were made by Monroe pupils. It is a pleasure to report that five of our teachers have taken courses at the University or the Teachers College during the last few months.

As usual the school property has been kept in perfect condition. A storehouse has been built beyond the outdoor stage and the attic of the school insulated. The rock wool used for insulation together with the flooring to be put over it will save fuel and furnish protection from incendiary bombs. As a further protection some temporary movable stairs to the attic have been constructed. For the better receiving of a warning in case of an air raid a telephone has been installed. In accord with instructions sent out by the defense council it is planned to shelter the children in the inside corridors of the school should a raid occur. Drills are being held so the pupils may know where to go if an alarm is given.
