**ARTICLE 2**—Loren Bort made the motion that we take up the budget item by item. Motion seconded by Larkin Burrill. Vote passed. Donald Hall, Chairman of the budget committee read the budget.

At the end of the meeting Harland E. Bedell made the motion to accept the budget as amended. Motion seconded by Linfield Ward. Passed by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 3**—Loren Bort made the motion to accept this article. Seconded by Harland E. Bedell. Passed by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 4**—Motion made by Harland E. Bedell and seconded by Merle Powers: To appropriate the sum of \$10,118.00 for a fire truck, and authorize the withdrawal of eight thousand one hundred and eighteen (\$8,118.00) dollars for this purpose from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972, with the balance of \$2,000.00 to be raised by taxation. Motion passed by voice vote.

Motion made by Harland E. Bedell and seconded by Everett Fitzgerald that \$5,000.00 be raised for running the fire department. Passed by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 5**—Harland E. Bedell made the motion that we raise \$300.00 for each, the Northeastern Vermont Regional Hospital, the Littleton Hospital and the Woodsville Volunteer Ambulance Service. Motion seconded by Richard Fagnant. Passed by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 6**—Motion made by Loren Bort and seconded by George Tyler that the town raise \$15,000.00 for the purpose of the support of the Clinic and keeping a physician in town. Passed by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 7**—Motion made by Harland E. Bedell and seconded by Larkin Burrill that we raise \$311.83 for Town Road Aid. Motion passed by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 8**—Motion was made by Warren Nye and seconded by George Tyler that we raise the sum of \$488.75 for the White Mountain Community Services. Motion passed by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 9**—Motion made by Harland E. Bedell that we raise the sum of \$300.00 for the White Mountain Region Association. Seconded by Dorothy Lang. Passed by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 10**—Motion made by Laura Bort and seconded by Dorothy Lang that we raise the sum of \$385.00 for North Country Health Agency. Passed by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 11**—Motion made by Helen Clement and seconded by Donald Hall that we raise the amount requested in the budget for State Aid Construction. Passed by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 12**—Loren Bort made the motion, seconded by Lyman Cook that we raise the amount requested in the budget for water construction. Passed by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 13**—Motion made by Merle Powers and seconded by Harland E. Bedell that we raise \$5,000.00 as requested in the budget. Passed by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 14**—Loren Bort made a motion to pass over this article. Seconded by Laura Bort. Passed by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 15**—Loren Bort made the motion that the Selectmen sell the Frank George lot. Seconded by Donald Hall. Passed by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 16**—Motion made by Harland E. Bedell seconded by Merle Powers that the town purchase a trailer. Passed by voice vote.

**ARTICLE 17**—Vote in favor of Beano Yes 75; No 60.

**ARTICLE 18**—Loren Bort reported on the clinic.

**ARTICLE 19**—The motion was made by George Tyler and seconded by Fred Rothe that the voters of the Town of Monroe elect a committee; this committee to submit for voter approval a long range plan incorporating economic, political and esthetic considerations for the future of the town. Further that said committee bring its preliminary plan to a recessed

meeting of the voters on Saturday, June 23, 1973 at 7:30 P.M. Passed by voice vote.

The following list of names was given for the committee: Victor Holtzinger, Loren Bort, Helen Clement, Lois Cole, Wesley Moore, George Tyler, Harland E. Bedell, Elwyn Gibson. Committee accepted by voice vote.

Harland E. Bedell made the motion that the selectmen and Fire Chief be a committee to buy the new fire truck. Seconded by Merle Powers. Passed by voice vote.

George Tyler made the motion that an article be inserted in the warrant for the 1974 town meeting, to hold annual town meetings during evening hours. Seconded by Mrs. George Smith. Passed by voice vote.

**THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Monroe in the County of Grafton in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Monroe Town Hall in said Monroe, N.H. on Tuesday, the 5th day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To choose a Delegate to the Constitutional Convention.
4. To see if the voters will authorize the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to borrow a sum or sums not to exceed \$175,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be repaid during the current municipal year, from taxes collected within the current municipal year.
5. To see how much money the Town will raise for the support of Northeastern Vermont Regional Hospital, Littleton Hospital, Woodsville Hospital, and Woodsville Ambulance Service.
6. To see how much money the Town will appropriate for the purpose of keeping a physician in town, and for the support of the Clinic.
7. To see how much money the Town will raise and appropriate for Town Road Aid.

8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$488.75 for the White Mountain Community Services, Inc.

9. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for the White Mountain Region Association.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$390.00 to North Country Home Health Agency, Inc.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the required amount for State Aid Construction.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$15,000.00 to extend the water system 2000 feet into the Harleyview Acres development.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,400.00 to extend the water system 600 feet into Ralph Hammonds' development.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to extend the water system from its present northerly end to the Robert Locke residence.

15. To see whether the Town will authorize and direct the Selectmen to accept and take over the roads in Harland P. Bedell's subdivision known as Harleyview Acres, and/or Ralph Hammond's Pine Plains subdivision, or any portions of such roads, at such time or times as they meet TRA standards, and whether the Town will authorize and direct the Selectmen to oil or tar such roads upon their acceptance.

# **SCHOOL WARRANT**

## **THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE**

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of Monroe qualified to vote in district affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said district on the 9th day of March 1974, polls to be open for the election of District Officers at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon and to close not earlier than 6:30 o'clock in the afternoon. Action on all articles to commence at 1:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

ARTICLE 1. To choose, by non-partisan ballot, a Moderator for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. To choose, by non-partisan ballot, a School District Clerk for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 3. To choose, by non-partisan ballot, a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 4. To choose, by non-partisan ballot, an Auditor for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 5. To choose, by non-partisan ballot, one School Board Member for a term of three years.

ARTICLE 6. To determine and appoint salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.

ARTICLE 7. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 8. To see what sums of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the district will vote to authorize the school board to make application for and to accept, on behalf of the district, any or all grants or offers for educational purposes which may now or hereafter be forthcoming from the State of New Hampshire and/or United States.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the district will vote to authorize the application of any unanticipated income to expenses.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the District will vote to indemnify and save harmless any officer or employee for loss or damage arising out of any claim, demand, suit, or judgment by reason of negligence or other act resulting in accidental injury to a person or accidental damage to or destruction of property while said officer or said employee is acting in his official capacity or employment pursuant to the provisions of New Hampshire R.S.A. 31:105.

To see if the voters of the district will vote to rescind the vote of the School Meeting of March 11, 1972 on Article 10, and will vote to pay the full tuition for high school students from Monroe at area schools; and, in addition the district to provide reliable transportation for each student at a cost not to exceed \$500.00 per year.

## **REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF**

The New Hampshire Forest Fire Service is represented in every town, city or unorganized place in our state by the forest fire warden. Anyone wishing to kindle an outside fire when the ground is not covered with snow must first obtain the written permission of the fire warden. Except for cooking fires, no fire can be kindled between 9:00 A.M. and 5:00 P.M. unless it is a commercial or industrial burn or it is raining. The fire warden is assisted in his work by the District Forest Fire Chief who works for the Department of Resources and Economic Development Forest Fire Service.

Fire prevention was, again this year, the most important part of the Forest Fire Warden's job. Fire statistics show the need with 72% of the fires caused by smoking, debris burning and children. Smokey the Bear is an important prevention tool but he still needs much help from the public. Parents should warn their children of the hazards of playing with matches. Children tend to forget that a lighted match held in their hand is a potential forest fire.

Following are copies of new laws relating to physical examinations and immunizations necessary for children entering school:

## RSA 200:38

“Control and Prevention of Communicable Diseases” 200:38-I states: “All children shall be immunized prior to school entrance according to the current recommendations of the State Public Health Agency.”

The recommendations of the Division of Public Health become requirements of the State Board and local school boards by this statute.

The immunizations listed below must be completed prior to school entry:

1. Measles Vaccine (live attenuated) (having had measles is acceptable when verified.)
2. Oral Trivalent Polio Vaccine (Sabin)
3. Diphtheria, Pertussia, and Tetanus (DPT) (Adult type DT when over 6 years of age)
4. Rubella Vaccine

Routine smallpox vaccination is not recommended.

Other vaccinations are optional.

200:38-III states: “All children shall be examined prior to school entrance to detect symptoms of tuberculosis and may be periodically examined during his school experience.”

Tuberculin Test (intradermal) (within one year prior to school entrance)

RSA 200:32 states: A medical examination is required upon or prior to entrance into the public school system and thereafter as often as deemed necessary by the local school authority.

There are two articles in this year's warrant that should be mentioned in this report:

Article 12: Refers to an article passed at the school meeting of March 11, 1972 which said that after a four-year period the Monroe School District would pay the average tuition charged at the various area high schools. This article simply reverts to the old policy of paying the full tuition charged at any area high school.

Article 11: Deals with a recently passed statute by the New Hampshire Legislature which permits local districts to indemnify any school board member, teacher or administrator from personal damage arising out of any suit or claim while performing his professional or legal duties.

Also, the Monroe School Board has voted a new policy relative to paying for extra charges at the various high schools where Monroe Students are in attendance. The new policy reads as follows:

***Policy:***

That the Monroe School District will pay for, from tax sources, the following items, namely: Tuition, Books, Transportation and graduation expenses. All other costs will be the responsibility of the sending parent or guardian.

## ***REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS***

I herewith submit my fourth annual report to the voters of the Monroe School District:

Our school year began with an orientation-workshop for the entire Supervisory Union Staff. The workshop was held at the Woodsville High School on August 28th, 29th and 30th. The keynote address was delivered by Dr. Dean C. Corrigan, Dean of the School of Education, University of Vermont. Dr. Corrigan spoke on the subject: Personalizing Teaching; Goals and Processes. The workshop dealt with a number of timely subjects including: Computerized Math in the Intermediate Grades, Nutrition Education, The New Hampshire Plan for Teacher Renewal, Pre-School Readiness, Special Education, Classroom Accountability, and Learning Disabilities at the Secondary Level. Fifteen special consultants were involved and eight of these were from our own staff. The workshop was funded entirely by the Supervisory Union and will be a regular annual function.

The Supervisory Union Board, at its spring meeting, authorized the formation of a Staff Development Committee. This committee is responsible for the formulation of a three year master plan for the re-certification of staff members according to guidelines set down by the State Department of Education. The new plan must allow for each staff member to complete a minimum of 50 clock hours of approved activity in each three year period in order to maintain their teaching certificate. It is felt that the new system should allow for a wider variety of educational experiences for teachers. Activities may include, curriculum work, in-service training, visits to other schools and school systems, travel, etc., in addition to graduate level college courses. The Staff Development Committee is composed of 15 members, broadly

representative of Administrators, Teachers, Parents, and Students. The new plan is scheduled to become effective in the Fall of 1975.

On May 14th, 15th and 16th, Mr. John Economopoulos, Elementary School Services Coordinator, State Department of Education, will conduct an evaluation of the Elementary Schools in Supervisory Union #23. This evaluation will be made with respect to the State's minimum standards for the elementary schools. Considering the comprehensiveness of our curriculum and the excellence of our school facilities I feel confident that we will receive a favorable evaluation.

Our shared services in the areas of Art, Guidance, Physical Education and Music is a relatively new program and we continue to evaluate it in terms of curriculum content and teacher competency. At the present time we feel that the children are deriving considerable benefit from these activities.

Next year we hope to expand our curriculum by offering French. At present we plan to have a formal program at the Junior High level which will include French grammar. At the elementary level, plans call for an enrichment program that will introduce the French language in an informal way through plays, songs, art experiences, etc.

Last summer the Monroe Consolidated School offered summer sessions to any student who wished to attend. The program was designed to give extra help to those students who needed it or to enrich the more able student as the case may be. These sessions ran in the morning for a six week period, ending in early August. Four tutors were involved, who met with the children either individually or in small groups. In all 26 children were enrolled and 25 of these participated for the full six weeks. The program was considered

highly successful and will probably be continued on a yearly basis. Mr. Fullerton, Mrs. Glines, Miss Kay and Miss Powers were the instructors.

Mrs. Helena Parker has taken charge of our school lunch program from the very capable hands of Mrs. Drusilla Wright. Mrs. Wright has retired after twenty-two years of service to the children of the Monroe School District. We want to take this opportunity to extend to Mrs. Wright our appreciation for her years of service and our best wishes for the future.

I wish to thank the School Board, Staff and everyone connected with the Monroe School District for their fine cooperation.

## SUPERVISORY UNION #23 REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT'S SALARY

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the superintendent.

One-half of the supervisory union expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the union on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30. The Superintendent of Supervisory Union #23, during 1973-1974, will receive a salary of \$19,600.00, which is made up as follows: \$2,500.00 to be paid by the State Department of Education and \$17,100.00 prorated among the several school districts. Allowance of \$1,500.00 for travel within the Union is also prorated as stated above.

## **SUMMARY PROGRAM OF THE WHITE MOUNTAINS REGION ASSOCIATION**

Your Region Association, through its promotional and financial responsibilities, was one of the principal organizers of the White Mountains Art and Music Festival. This Festival has been acclaimed as a truly significant contribution to northern New Hampshire and in 1974, with a much larger budget, the program is expected to expand markedly.

Your Region Association also helped to set up the Hotel-Motel training program at the Waumbek, Jefferson, N.H. Because your Association has for many years promoted the region's hotel-motel industry, the directors felt this training program would effectively compliment these on-going promotional activities. The responsibilities incurred by your Association were: a questionnaire designed to answer "Is there a need for the program" and assistance in employing graduates of the program in the region's hotel-motel industry. Additionally, your Association set up meetings with hotel-motel owners and managers to work out any problems and to exchange ideas.

Other activities for 1973 included: completion of a canoe and kayak folder (designed for promotional purposes), a State requested survey of flood damage to the private sector of northern New Hampshire's economy, representation at the Eastern State Exposition in Springfield, Mass., presentation of 4-H awards in Grafton and Coos Counties and annual subscriptions of the 4-H National News Magazine to club leaders, and the annual solicitations of listings for the **New Hampshire Accommodations and Dining Directory** and the **Where to Stay** folder. Additionally, your Association's executive director acted as secretary of the N.H. Council of Region Associations, an organization which works closely with the State's Office of Vacation Travel.

Your Association for its 1973 annual meeting set up a panel discussion on the subject of "Wilderness in the White Mountain National Forest." Panelists included representatives of the N.H. Snowmobile Association, the Appalachian Mountain Club, the Society for the Protection of N.H. Forests, Sno-engineering, the wood products industry in northern New Hampshire, the Sierra Club, the State's Bureau of Off-Highway Recreation Vehicles, the U.S. Forest Service and the North Country RC&D Project, Inc.

With regard to legislated matters your Association supported House Bill relative to Open Space. In large part the directors saw this bill as an attempt to help preserve our farmlands here in the region. Furthermore, your Association supported House Bill #10 relative to Off-Highway Vehicles with the exception that the majority of directors felt snowmobilers should ask the permission of the land-owners during periods when there is adequate snow cover.

Finally, the executive director spoke on Association activities both on radio and before several chambers of commerce and rotary clubs in the region.

Inquiries for the year totaled 5,000.

Wrote 27 news releases, 2 newsletters and 140 personal letters.

## **MONROE CLINIC REPORT**

The year 1973 marked some new advancements in the Monroe Clinic.

There was a total of 1207 Office Calls, of this total 215 were new patients. One full day was devoted to examining 50 school children.

In February we began dispensing medicine at 10% above cost. This has proven to be a convenience as well as a saving to our patients.

In November, through the courtesy of Littleton Hospital, Mrs. Lorraine Ross began providing laboratory facilities, which has saved our patients needless travel to a hospital.

Dr. Richard Monroe is conducting a surgical clinic every two weeks.

We feel that we are indeed fortunate in having acquired Dr. Marvin Kendall, who will be starting at the Clinic October 1, 1974 and holding office hours four days a week.

The total expenditures for 1973 were \$12,654.38, which included approximately \$1300.00 for new equipment. Credits amounted to \$2311.98 of which \$2240.00 was returned to the Town for sale of medicine. We also have on hand, as of January 1, 1974, an inventory of medicine and supplies amounting to \$3000.00.

We again thank the voters of Monroe for appropriating the money to make the Monroe Clinic a reality.

I wish, at this time, to thank the members of the Committee for their extreme cooperation and to Mrs. Loren Bort for her excellent help as secretary.
