MARCH 8 and 9, 1988

The polls were declared open at 12 o'clock noon and declared closed by the Moderator at 6:00 p.m. The annual meeting was called to order at 10:13 p.m.

A motion was made by Bernard Bradshaw that we proceed article by article, seconded by Lark Burrill. Motion passed on a voice vote.

Article 1. The following officers were declared elected by the non-partisan ballot:

Article 3. Motion made by Rocky Bunnell that the Selectmen be so authorized to sell and dispose of such radar equipment. Seconded by Christopher Robsham. Discussion followed. Rocky Bunnell requested that a ballot vote be taken. The required 5 signatures were given to the moderator and a written ballot was taken. Results were:

Motion was defeated.

Motion made by Margaret Hunt to recess this meeting until tomorrow night at 7:00 p.m. Seconded by Lark Burrill. The chair clarified that the meeting would have to be adjourned instead of recessed. A voice vote was taken with the majority in favor.

The meeting adjourned at 11:04 p.m.

### MARCH 9, 1988

The meeting was called to order at 7:02 p.m. on Wednesday, March 9, 1988.

Article 4. The motion that the Selectmen be so authorized to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund for the use as setoffs against budgeted appropriation for the following specific purpose and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

Appropriation--Town Maintenance	\$1,100.00
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was made by Lark Burrill. The second was from Bernard Bradshaw and passed by voice vote.

Article 5. Motion made by Keith Merchand that we table this item. Seconded by Alan Hughes. A vote by a show of hands was taken; the results were: YES 87 NO 32  
Motion was defeated.

Article 6. Motion made by Bernard Bradshaw that I so move. The article was to see if the town would vote to raise \$14,000.00 to be placed in the Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of replacing the bridge on Smutty Hollow Road. Seconded by Lark Burrill. Discussion followed; with a voice vote in favor of the motion.

Article 7. Lark Burrill made the motion that we have raised the money and that now we should spend it.

- Article 7. (continued) Seconded by Margaret Hunt. A majority voice vote was taken in the affirmative.
- Article 8. Alice Frazer made the motion that we accept this article as written in the 1987 Town Report. Seconded by Ruth Lang. A letter received by the Selectmen from Ruth Lang was read. The letter explained the reason for the article, (that a direct relative of Mr. Lang's family originally had lived on this road and that there was no official name for this road, which is the first left off Smutty Hollow Road.) A voice vote was taken and the motion carried.
- Article 9. John Shafer made the motion to so move. This article pertained to installing three new street lights:
- Paul Gibson residence-----Coppermine Hill Rd.  
Earl Frost residence-----Coppermine Hill Rd.  
Gordon Ward-----Route 135
- Second was by Paul Keenan and passed on a voice vote.
- Article 10. The article was read and Bernard Bradshaw made the request that this article be taken up later in the evening to allow Dr. Kollisch and Dr. Glowa to be here. They have office hours until 8:00 p.m. and didn 't feel they could be here before 8:30 p.m. and I feel that they deserve a chance to explain their position. So, I would like this article to be taken up after Article 19. The chair awaited a motion that Article 10 be postponed until we have taken action on the articles through and including Article 19. Lark Burrill's motion that he so move and a second by Bernard Bradshaw was voted in the affirmative.
- Article 11. Motion by Bernard Bradshaw that we so move. Seconded by Robert Wormer. An explanation of why the town of Monroe would like to acquire this land, (land would be deeded to the town free of charge and that the town has a water line in that area.) Motion passed by a voice vote.
- Article 12. Lothar Riba made the following motion: I move that the town vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law as set forth in RSA: 32 and further that the Budget Committee shall consist of twelve (12) members-at-large, and one (1) member chosen by the School Board and one (1) member chosen by the Board of Selectmen. The members-at-large shall be elected for staggered three (3) year terms in a manner provided for in RSA 32:2; and that the Town Moderator shall appoint the current duly-elected Budget Committee members to one (1) year terms which shall expire at the next annual Town Meeting. Seconded by Cindy Guibord. Discussion followed with Kevin Bruno, the Town's attorney, explaining what the Municipal Budget Law is. Lark Burrill explained how he felt the law worked when the town was under it in 1951-52. A ballot was called for; the

Article 13. Motion by Lark Burrill that the Selectmen be authorized to take whatever action seems advisable. Seconded by George Hall. Voice vote was in the the affirmative.

Article 14. Results of the Beano question from the ballot were:  
 YES 150 NO 76  
 Results of voting was affirmative.

Article 15. Brian St. Germain's motion that we accept this article as printed was seconded by Tom Bedell. This article refers to RSA 31:105 Indemnification for Damages. A voice vote was taken after some discussion, and the motion carried.

Article 16. Brian St. Germain's motion to accept all reports of committees and officers heretofore chosen, was seconded by Tom Bedell and passed on a voice vote.

Article 17. Lark Burrill's motion to accept this article as written was seconded by Robert Wormer. After much discussion, Mr. Farr asked to move the question. A 2/3 majority vote was required and the results were:

 Motion carried; article passed.

Article 18. A motion was made by Leslie Morrison to pass this article as it was written. Robert Wormer seconded this motion. A lengthy discussion followed and the following statement was read to the public and was asked by Richard Kleinfelder to be part of the minutes of the meeting: "The subject matter of this article is to authorize the withdrawal of money from the Capital Reserve Fund to purchase land in connection with the Village Sewer System. There is nothing in the article to indicate clearly that money is being appropriated. In addition there are no guidelines to the Selectmen with regard to purchasing the land. In the opinion of Lawrence Gardner this is an improperly warranted article; thereby making it illegal." Gerry Laflamme asked to move the question. Voting was done by a show of hands, with the following results: YES 69 + 79 + 2 = 150;  
 NO 15 + 9 = 24  
 The motion carried; article passed.

- Article 19. Lark Burrill made the following motion; moved: that action on Articles 19, 20, 22 and 23 be postponed until an adjourned session of this Town Meeting on July 12th at which time the New Hampshire General Court and Governor will have acted on pending legislation providing grants and/or loans to the Town for the construction of a sewage treatment system to bring the Village Sewer System into compliance with state and federal laws and regulations. Seconded by Paul Keenan. The chair consulted with Mr. Burrill to make sure he was only postponing articles 19, 20, 22 and 23. Mr. Burrill said "yes, only the articles specified." At the moderator's request Mr. Bradshaw gave information about the fines the town may be assessed if the deadline is not met. The moderator informed the public that the motion was open only for information not discussion. Mrs. Clement asked to move the motion. Mr. Green wished to have the following statement included in the minutes of the town meeting: Mr. Green stated that he wasn't allowed to address a question to the chair concerning statements made by Bernard Bradshaw during the time the motion was pending. A vote by a show of hands resulted in YES 22 + 35 = 57 NO 61 + 59 + 3 = 123 Motion was defeated. Leslie Morrison moved that we accept this article #19 as written. Seconded by Brian St. Germain. Motion was accepted by a majority voice vote.
- Article 10. Philip Blanchard's motion to raise an amended amount of \$72,000.00 for the purpose of expansion of the Clinic was seconded by Helen Clement. Dr. Glowa and Dr. Kollisch were present to give an explanation of the reason for this sum and also to answer any questions. Maynard Farr asked to move the question. The motion was accepted on a majority voice vote.
- Article 20. Leslie Morrison made the motion to accept this article as written. Seconded by Lark Burrill. Motion carried/ article passed.
- Article 21. Keith Merchand made the motion to table this article. Seconded by Brian St. Germain. A show of hands indicated these results: YES 55 + 56 + 3 = 114. NO 13 + 23 = 36. The motion carried.
- Article 22. Motion made by Bernard Bradshaw to pass over this article as we have accomplished this in Article #20. Seconded by Phyllis Knights; passed by a majority voice vote.
- Article 23. Motion made by Gerry Laflamme to table this article. Seconded by Keith Merchand. A majority voice vote was affirmative.
- Article 24. Maynard Farr moved to accept this article as written. Seconded by Keith Merchand. Motion carried on a majority voice vote.

Article 25. Bernard Bradshaw's motion-I move that the sum of \$497,848.24 be raised for the purpose as stated in this article. Seconded by Fred Dolch. Mr. Bradshaw explained some of the expenses the town was face with and therefore this sum should be raised. A majority voice vote was taken in the affirmative.

Article 26. Bernard Bradshaw informed the public on what had happened since the special town meeting concerning the sewage proplem. Questions and discussion followed. Mr. Lark Burrill made the motion to adjourn this town meeting; seconded by Sandy Lang. Voice vote was in favor of adjourning.

Mutual aid runs to Barnet increased this past year since Barnet's tank truck was totaled while responding to a fire early last year. Our response was changed at this time from 24 hour automatic to structure fires to 24 hour automatic on all fire calls in Barnet.

The pumper in the village is a 1973 and is in need of some major repairs if it is going to remain in service and not be replaced. Therefore, I would ask for your support in voting in the affirmative on the two warrant articles pertaining to this at Town Meeting. If this money is raised we should be able to expect another ten years of service from this piece of equipment. The other alternative to this is to temporarily keep fixing the tank and replace the complete truck in a couple of years at a cost of \$150,000 plus. With all of the other major expenditures to face, I would again say that I hope you would support the two articles.

As always, I want to thank the men of the Department for their dedicated service this past year. The roster is currently at 21 firefighters, the highest in quite a few years.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN

STATE FOREST RANGER

Between July 1987 and June 1988, we experienced more fires than normal. The three leading causes of forest fires were again children, fires kindled without written permission of a Forest Fire Warden, and debris burning. All causes are preventable, but only with your help.

Please help our town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. Contact your Forest Fire Warden for more information.

Enforcement of a state timber harvest regulation is the responsibility of State Forestry officials. Our state has excellent timber harvest regulations; however, your assistance is needed.

If you know of a logging operation and suspect a state timber harvest law may be violated, call your Forest Fire Warden, Concord Forest Protection Headquarters at (603) 271-2217, or local Forest Ranger.

On January 1, 1989, the Deceptive Forestry Business Practices Law (RSA 224:54) goes into effect. This law, in summary, states that a person is guilty of a misdemeanor if, in the course of buying or selling a forest product, he uses a false weight or measure for falsely determining any quality or quantity of a forest product. For more information, contact one of the persons mentioned above.

## 1988 LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

On January 1, 1989 I started my sixteenth year as your librarian/library administrator. Looking back, it does not seem that long. I guess when you are doing something you enjoy, time passes quickly. When I graduated from high school I had intended to attend college to become a librarian but marriage to Lark and the war put an end to that ambition. I really never thought of achieving that ambition. Raising three children and being a wife kept me busy for most of the later years. However, fate played a hand and I became the librarian here on January 1, 1974. Through the years I acquired the skills I needed through the Public Library Techniques Courses at the summer sessions at the University of New Hampshire and the on-the-job training of doing, listening to our patrons, and hours of work. This just proves that you can fulfill an ambition by different roads than you expected. Thank you for the opportunity. I am now looking forward to the computer age in libraries which is becoming more necessary every year.

Last year the University of New Hampshire Library received a new larger computer. The UNH computer was moved to the State Library in Concord as their computer was full with, among other things, the databases of all the public libraries in the state who received catalog cards through the State Library since 1980. We have a database which lists all our acquisitions of the current and previous year since that time. It makes borrowing through Interlibrary Loan much easier. Last year the computer from the State Library was moved to Lamson Library at Plymouth State College and we are a member of the Five Rivers Area Library Network. All our databases are being held by Blackwell of North America and when the Lamson Library/PSC holdings are loaded by the end of February, all our holdings will be returned to Five Rivers in June, 1989 to start loading in July, 1989. When we have a computer and a modem we will be in a position to access all the public library databases, the State Colleges, Dartmouth College, which means we have at hand the collections of all these libraries. When I became Librarian, this was not heard of and now we are within reach of all this learning.

Susan Price retired as Library Trustee in September, and I wish to thank her for all the time and help she gave the library for five years. She has not left us entirely as she took on the custodian's job when Bob Newton left. Michelle Griggs was voted onto the board last year when Terry Ward retired. Her husband was transferred so she really did not get her wings wet. Doris Cook, who had been a Trustee early in my years with the library consented to fill out this spot until town meeting. Doris has done a great deal of volunteer work for me this last year and it has been much appreciated for it helps me get tasks done which are always hanging fire. Terry Ward came on until town meeting, replacing Sue Price. We thank both these people for helping us out at this time. Phyllis Green is our board chairman and treasurer and we owe her a lot of thanks, too.

If you have not visited your library, Becky Gibson, the other desk person and I would like to welcome you to your library. We are only too glad to help in any way we can. Our hours are: Tuesdays- 10 a.m. to 12 p.m. and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m.; Wednesdays 6 p.m. to 8 p.m.; Thursdays 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.; and Saturdays 9 a.m. to 12 noon; closed all national and state holidays. I wish to thank my husband, Lark Burrill for his tolerance and help in having the library work inevitably at home and taking up so much of my time. He has also transported me to various places on library business or in pursuit of some need. I think he enjoys the forays on trips to book stores. I can always find him in the sports book section. Our almost 45 years of marriage has gone as fast as my library time and has been most rewarding.

Heather Lamont left the Library to become Town Clerk last spring. She served the library well as trustee and then Assistant Librarian with an emphasis on Children's Programming. She and Sue Price were the prime movers behind the well-received community historical calendar of 1988. Their efforts were of great benefit to the library. Thanks again for a job well done.

## MONROE CLINIC TOWN REPORT - 1988

1988 was a year of great changes for the Clinic. The Town generously voted to fund a major expansion of the Clinic building and Al Davis of McIndoe Falls ably constructed the beautiful addition. The space is highly functional as well as attractive, and has improved our efficiency. We are now in a much better position to recruit another physician or other health care provider; with more doctors we will be able to see more patients in a timely fashion.

We had a total of 5800 office visits, performed school physicals on 70 Monroe students, and delivered 41 babies. We continue to stock durable medical equipment for loan, such as crutches, walkers, wheelchairs, and hospital beds. The Clinic is used after-hours for such health-related meetings as Al-Anon. We are also honored to be a teaching site for students who come up from the Dartmouth Medical School to learn about practice in the community. Two prints gracing the waiting room were donated by Al-Anon. Mr. Robert Simblest donated a fine wheelchair in memory of his mother, Margaret.

In addition to their Clinic office hours, our doctors remain involved in other medical activities. Dr. Glowa provides services to women at the St. Johnsbury Planned Parenthood office, and Dr. Kollisch teaches down at Dartmouth. Both of them admit patients to the Cottage Hospital in Woodsville, and Dr. Kollisch just finished a two-year term as President of the Medical Staff. We continue to actively participate in two networks of medical offices which do research on the illnesses seen in general practice, and we greatly appreciate the cooperation of our patients.

We are honored to serve the people of Monroe and other surrounding towns and greatly appreciate the support the Town of Monroe has given to the Clinic. We look forward to 1989 with hopes for another doctor and for continued good relations with the Town.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL, INC.

ANNUAL REPORT

North Country Council observed its sixteenth year of successful operation in 1988. The Council, chartered under NH RSA 36:45, provides non-profit local and regional planning assistance to member municipalities. The Board of Directors determined that last year's work program would focus on community planning, economic development, solid waste, transportation and housing. The Council maintains four standing committees which monitor local issues and determine Council policy. Overall, the Council's major objective is to work with North Country towns in solving local and regional problems.

In Monroe, the Council began preparation of the Town's Master Plan. NCC staff assisted the Planning Board in reviewing a large development proposal and attended several Board meetings to provide general planning assistance.

Community planning assistance continues to dominate our staff resources. New state mandates and rapid residential and commercial growth throughout the region places an increasing burden on local planning and zoning boards in 1988. Regional workshops, technical bulletins and newsletters, ordinance review and update, as well as review of specific subdivision and site plan applications are a sampling of the myriad services performed this year for our membership. The Council also co-sponsored the popular Municipal Law Lecture Series which reviewed new case law and other specific areas of legal interest to local officials.

In addition, grant writing and grant administration continue as important components of the Council's work program. Currently, NCC staff members are working twelve towns administering fifteen Community Development Block Grant programs. These projects include feasibility studies for local infrastructure needs, water and sewer construction projects and targeted housing rehabilitation programs for income eligible residents.

In summary, it is important to understand that the North Country Council is organized and administered for the benefit of its constituents, local town governments. Our future success is, in large part, contingent upon your participation in Council activities. We rely on and appreciate involvement of town officials and residents and look forward to assisting your town this coming year.

In September 1988, Newbury Waste Management, Inc. purchased the former Powers-Leete Landfill in Newbury, Vermont. This letter is to inform the residents of the New Hampshire municipalities which use the Newbury Landfill of our plans to move forward with the development of this landfill for future use.

The State of Vermont's Act 78 requires that all existing landfills install liners and leachate collection systems in order to continue operating beyond 1991. It is our intention to move forward with the hydrogeologic testing necessary to provide the groundwork from which future development of the Newbury Landfill can occur. In order to facilitate the required engineering, it was necessary for us to increase the rates at the Newbury Landfill effective January 5, 1989. The revenues generated from this rate increase will be utilized to work towards the continued operation of the Newbury Landfill in conformance with Vermont's solid waste management laws.

Notwithstanding this increase in the tipping fees at the landfill, the per-capita assessments that are included in the New Hampshire municipal contracts will not be affected. Over the coming years, it is our intention to phase out these per-capita assessments and finance the landfill operations exclusively with users' fees. This will eliminate the need for municipalities to raise local revenues. It is our view that users' fees provide a more equitable means of financing the landfill operations because they more accurately pass along the true costs of waste management according to the amount of waste generated.

Finally, we will be making available to all Monroe residents the opportunity to recycle at the Newbury Landfill. By the time you receive this Town Report, a recycling container will be installed at the Newbury landfill for use by residents of all municipalities currently using the facility. The recycling container will collect newspaper, glass, tin cans, and plastic containers. Further details concerning the recycling program at the Newbury Landfill will be made available through your municipal offices.

1988 Report of Services

The North Country Home Health Agency, Inc. is a not-for-profit community service Agency serving twenty-one area communities. We are celebrating our eighteenth year of providing care in the North Country. The Agency's services include intermittent Skilled Nursing Care, Clinics, Physical, Speech and Occupational Therapy, Homemaker/Home Health Aide and Parent-Aide assistance. Town funding is used to help provide these services to individuals and families who do not have insurance or who are only able to afford to pay a portion of the cost of care. All who receive care are asked to contribute towards the cost of that care, if they are able.

In 1988 the Agency expanded programs to include Respite Care for clients with Alzheimer's Disease and Related Disorders and Adult-In-Home Day Care. Both programs are funded by State/Federal money client fees.

The North Country Home Health Agency, Inc. is proud to continue the tradition of providing quality home care started by the Littleton Community Nurse Association sixty-five years ago. We value the support of the community and commend each of you for your concern for those in need of Home Care.

The North Country Home Health Agency provided a total of 10,175 visits and 28,658 hours of Adult-In-Home Care in 1988. The following service totals were provided in Monroe during 1988:

## WHITE MOUNTAIN MENTAL HEALTH & DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES

### 1988 Director's Report

During this past year, our Agency has attempted to increase our ability to serve the most impaired clients in our communities. We have expanded many of our support services (respite services, apartment supervision) and our vocational programs to those clients. The intent has been to assist mentally ill and developmentally impaired clients to attain a more stable and normal existence in the community. We feel that our efforts have been successful. We have almost doubled our respite and apartment supervision service. Furthermore, we have placed over 34 clients into independent jobs through our Transitional Employment Program.

We were also successful in opening a Developmental Service program in Pike to serve clients in the Woodsville, Warren, Pike and Piermont areas. During our first year of operation, we were able to serve nine (9) clients.

During this next year, we would like to target two new projects: first, to open a small (six clients) home in Littleton for mentally ill clients. We have already secured Federal support for this project for the next five years. Secondly, we would like to expand our respite service by establishing a respite house in our catchment area. The second project is only in the beginning stages and may extend over a two-year period of time to develop.

The following is a brief summary of our work during this past year.

Mental Health Services - We operate one full-time and three part-time offices. The full-time office is located in Littleton at 16 Maple St. The part-time offices are located in Woodsville at Woodsville Clinic, in Lincoln at the Lin-Wood Medical Center, and in Lancaster at Weeks Memorial Hospital.

Last year, we saw 739 individuals.

- . 129 children age 0 - 17
- . 523 adults age 18-59
- . 87 elderly age 60+
- . 53% of our service was through individual or conjoint(couples) therapy
- . 27% of service was through group therapy
- . 13% of service was through family therapy
- . 7% of service was through physician service (psychiatrist).

We continue to offer an array of services including: emergency, drug and alcohol, case management, inpatient, and partial hospitalization.

#### Developmental Services

. Early Intervention - Home based service for 0-3 year old children who are delayed in their development. Services include: screening, assessment, treatment, and referral. Last year, we served over forty-five families.

. Day Habilitation Program - Provides instruction to our most severely impaired adult population. The program works in conjunction with their residential programming as well as providing training and instruction in self care skills, pre-vocational skills, paid work, and other therapeutic services such as speech therapy and physical therapy. This program has been primarily used by former Laconia State School residents; however, we have had community clients who have been referred by the local school systems. Last year, we served ten (10) clients.

. Supported Employment - Provides training, instruction, and work adjustment for vocational and job needs. Paid work opportunities for the individuals can take place either in the community or in the Workshop itself. The programs have been successful in meeting their objectives and are popular with the individuals who have participated. Last year, we served twenty-four (24) clients. Two clients were successfully placed. Seventeen (17) are currently employed, and five (5) have withdrawn from the program.

We are grateful for your past support of our programs and look forward to continuing to serve you in the future.

- ARTICLE 1: To choose, by non-partisan ballot, a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- ARTICLE 2: To choose, by non-partisan ballot, a School District Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ARTICLE 3: To choose, by non-partisan ballot, a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- ARTICLE 4: To choose, by non-partisan ballot, one School Board Member for a term of three years.

ARTICLE 9: George Tyler made a motion seconded by Esther Tyler to accept the Article as printed. Article passed on a voice vote.

ARTICLE 10: Robert Simblest made a motion seconded by Deborah Clough to see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$772,942.21 for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officers and agents and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of said sums as are estimated to be received from the State Foundation Aid Fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town. The Article passed with a voice vote.

ARTICLE 11: Other business

Motion was made by Keith Merchant seconded by Larkin Burrill to adjourn the meeting. The meeting was adjourned at 9:53 P.M. by the Moderator.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and citizens of Monroe School District, I submit my second annual report.

This past year has been a challenging and exciting one in School Administrative Unit 23. The SAU has been awarded competitive grants in the areas of gifted and talented education, drug and alcohol education and training for administrators. One of the goals of the SAU has been to develop a coordinated health education program. Harold Haskins has been working with a committee to develop a comprehensive K-12 health education curriculum and we have been awarded two grants totaling \$11,454.22 to purchase educational materials and to develop drug and alcohol awareness programs. A second goal has been to develop a gifted and talented program. The SAU has received a \$15,000. start-up grant to fund a part time gifted and talented coordinator for the 1988-89 school year. Mrs. Deborah Schulenburg has joined our staff and is working to develop programs for students and to coordinate staff training. The SAU Board, recognizing the needs of the individual districts in this area, voted to continue to fund this position as part of the 1989-90 SAU budget. We look forward to continuing to expand educational opportunities for this segment of our school population.

A third goal of the SAU Administration is to update and revise existing curriculum and develop written curriculum where none presently exists. We are now in the process of providing training in curriculum development to administrators and teachers through a grant written by Keith Pfeifer. Curriculum committees will be working to insure that our educational program is coordinated in grades K-12 and meets the needs of our student body.

The Monroe School District has also been awarded a \$10,025.23 Computer for Teachers Grant through the Governor's Initiative for Excellence. This grant provides computers, software and thirty-six hours of training for all of our teachers. Our faculty has been very active in effectively utilizing computer technology.

The administration has also been working to review the building needs of each district in the SAU. Increasing enrollments, state and federal mandates and the general condition of our school buildings are a problem in all of our school districts. In Monroe, a citizens committee under the leadership of Mr. Thomas Bedell has worked with the school board, architect and administration to develop a plan that will meet the educational needs of our student body at a reasonable cost to the taxpayer. This proposal will be presented at the Annual School District meeting for your consideration.

In closing I would like to thank the school board, principal, faculty, parents and members of the community for your commitment to and support of our schools. I would also like to recognize an individual who has played an important role in the Monroe School District. Harold Haskins, Assistant Superintendent of Schools for the past nineteen years will retire at the end of the 1988-89 school year. Harry started his career thirty-two years ago as a teacher in Gloucester, Massachusetts and then taught in Manchester and Wolburn, Massachusetts. In September, 1966 Harry assumed the principalship of the Lincoln-Woodstock Cooperative Elementary Schools and four years later was promoted to the newly created position of Assistant

Superintendent of Schools. In his first annual report to the districts as Assistant Superintendent Harry wrote, "I hope that my new position will afford me continuing opportunities to serve the educational needs of the children of the ...districts." As Assistant Superintendent Harry Haskins has played a major role in building our school system and through his leadership, commitment and expertise certainly served the educational needs of our children well. No one can deny that Harry has earned his retirement and yet we all recognize that when he retires a part of what has made our schools so successful will leave us. We wish Harry a happy and healthy retirement and appreciate that he chose to spend so many of his professional years working in SAU 23 to make our schools a better place for children.

## REPORT OF THE ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

I herewith submit my nineteenth annual report to the voters of the Monroe School District.

Once again I call your attention to the inclusion of an article in the school warrant calling for a bond of approximately \$1,252,600 for renovations and additions to the Monroe Consolidated School. As noted, last year enrollments have been increasing steadily since the middle seventies from a low of 65 students in 1976 to a present high of 101 students, the exact number presented in the high range of last year's projection. We are still deficient with respect to fire regulations, sanitation standards, handicapped accessibility and State minimum standards for instruction.

This year's proposal is more modest than last in that the new construction includes only a kitchen cafeteria. The overall renovations and addition responds to the fire codes, sanitary regulations and handicapped accessibility problems that apply. The main floor of the building, except for minor renovations, will remain the same. The major renovations will be done on the lower level where adequate space provisions will be made for our industrial arts and home economics programs as well as additional classroom space for the upper grades. The boilers will be replaced, the ventilating system will be upgraded and the entire building will be sprinklered.

The Monroe School Building Committee under the leadership of Mr. Tom Bedell has worked diligently to present a "no frills" plan which covers our needs at an affordable cost. I hope you will give this bonding article every favorable consideration.

This year Mrs. Debbie Schulenburg has been coordinating a program of education for our gifted and talented students throughout S.A.U. #23. This is an area that has long been neglected. We have made a firm commitment to students who show unusual ability not only in academics but in a wide range of other skills as well. As educators and parents we must be sensitive and perceptive to the abilities of these students and to help develop their talents. This year we've made a good beginning. I urge you to become more familiar with this worthwhile effort.

The S.A.U. #23 Health Curriculum Committee has had a very busy year implementing a coordinated health program in the schools of our districts. Our major emphasis has been in the areas of Drug and Alcohol Education, Child Abuse Education and A.I.D.S. Education, all are items of great public concern.

Here's Looking At You 2000 is a broad based approach to Drug and Alcohol Education. The heart of this program is the teacher's guides with over 150 lesson plans from kindergarten through grade 12. Each grade level kit contains a guide with complete instructions. The program addresses known risk factors such as drug-using friends and living in a family with chemically dependent members. It focuses on "get away" drugs, like alcohol, nicotine and marijuana. These materials contain clear "No Drug Use" messages for our children. To date we have sent 30 of our teachers to the three day Drug and Alcohol Workshops held by the State. Here's Looking At You 2000 kits are at work

in all of our schools. Additional kits and training will be provided as become available.

In the area of child abuse we are using the Think Safe - Stay Safe Program in grades kindergarten through six. It is a sexual abuse prevention program which emphasizes what to do, not what to fear. It is designed to provide the knowledge, communication skills and self confidence the children need to avoid or stop abuse. As a result of the program children should have the following skills:

1. Strategies for avoiding sexual abuse
2. Strategies for getting out of an abusive or potentially abusive situation
3. Ways to get help and support

The teachers have guidebooks which enable them to develop these concepts at school. The program also is designed to help parents strengthen them at home.

Each school in S.A.U. #23 has an A.I.D.S. Instructional Guide compiled by the University of the State of New York. This guide covers all grade levels and provides us with a valuable means to educate our children about a disease for which there is no cure. Such education is associated with moral, religious and legal values that need to be addressed as we go. The instruction provided will be age appropriate and will be based on a family life approach to A.I.D.S. education. We will try to insure that this program deals with the public health issues while reflecting established community values.

The S.A.U. #23 Health Committee has made significant progress in getting a variety of materials and information to our children concerning these critical health areas. They are to be congratulated.

Since this will be my final report as Assistant Superintendent, before retiring in June, I wish to take this opportunity to thank the many School Board Members, Administrators, Teachers, School Lunch Workers and Parents who have made my nineteen year tenure so satisfying.

Likewise, my thanks to Mr. Norman H. Mullen and Dr. Douglas B. McDonald, the two Superintendents for whom I had the good fortune to work. Both are fine gentlemen and extremely competent educational administrators.

I owe you all a deep debt of gratitude.

As Monroe School opened for the 1987-1988 school year, students were greeted with many new faces--a new Principal (Mr. Michael Vigue), a new secretary (Mrs. Sandra Lang), a new custodian (Mr. Willard Newton), a new 1st-2nd grade teacher (Mrs. Wendy Stavseth), a new kindergarten teacher (Mrs. Penelope Stevenson), a new physical education teacher (Mr. Mark Hamilton), as well as a new Superintendent (Mr. Douglas McDonald) and a new Assistant Superintendent (Mr. Keith Pfeifer).

By year's end, student enrollment would increase from 84 to 97 (15.48%) and many new programs and activities would be developed, including:

- A) The Court of Mustangs Chapter of The National Junior Honor Society (Grades 5-8)
- B) The Council of Six (student advisors from Grades 5-8)
- C) A community sponsored soccer intramural & intermural program for teams at both the primary (Grades 1-4) and middle school (Grades 5-8) and
- D) Expanded instructional programs in:
  - 1) Computer Science Education (Grades 3-8)
  - 2) Home Economics & Shop (Grades 5-8)
  - 3) Humanities Education (French, Music, Band, & Social Studies) and
  - 4) Mathematics: (Math Your Way for Grades 1-4), (Individualized math programs for special needs students 1-8), and (Algebra I for advanced 8th graders) and
  - 5) Language Arts: (whole language approach for grades K-4) (composition & creative writing 7-8)

In conjunction with School Administrative Unit #23, initiatives were also taken to develop a comprehensive health education curriculum, a gifted and talented education program, and a special needs program for students with emotional and/or developmental handicaps. These efforts are continuing.

Grant proposals were submitted to the Governor's Initiatives Office seeking funding of a "computer for teachers project," "a sixteen station computer laboratory for students," and a "Chapter II grant for computer software." Funding was awarded in the amount of \$10,470.06 for the Monroe computer for teachers project and in the amount of \$1,563.24 for computer software. A second effort will be made during 1988-1989 to secure funding for a computer laboratory.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE  
SCHOOL YEAR 1987-88

This year there were sixty-four students who participated in the school physicals done by Dr. Patricia Glowa and Dr. Donald Kollisch at the Monroe Clinic. Results of the physicals were sent home to the parents.

Vision screenings were done on all students with ten referrals recommended.

Hearing screenings were done with one referral recommended.

Sixty-six students were enrolled in the dental program. The dental program consists of cleaning, topical fluoride application to the teeth, and instructions on good dental hygiene. This was done by the hygienist Sheila Amidon.

During the school year there were five cases of chickenpox and about 18 cases of strep throat.

Number of home visits totaled five.

In May kindergarten registration was held with nineteen students enrolling.

## REPORT OF THE MONROE BUILDING COMMITTEE

In response to last year's school district meeting the Monroe School Board elicited volunteers to serve on a building committee. The volunteers included Tom Bedell, Connie Jones, Eric Snogren, Catherine Hughes, Alice Frazer, Terry Gorham, Laurie Boswell and Jeanne Ward. The committee has been meeting every other week since early July.

The committee's aim was to take a conservative approach to meeting the needs of the school and community.

The first priority was to bring the school up to today's fire standards. The building fails to meet numerous fire safety codes. The school does not have sprinklers or adequate fire exits. The Fire Marshall's report of January 27, 1988 and January 10, 1989 recommends installing a fully approved detection and alarm system. It has also been recommended that corridors and stairwells be upgraded and window escapes be added if necessary. In addition, current fire safety codes do not permit children in kindergarten and first grade to be below grade level.

The present boilers have served the school for many years. With an extensive renovation it would be advisable to replace them as we could expect to save up to 15% of yearly fuel costs if more efficient units were installed. There are ceiling radiators in classrooms downstairs which should be replaced to improve heating efficiency and for safety considerations. The old part of the school needs new efficient windows installed and the 1966 addition should have storm windows added to decrease heat loss.

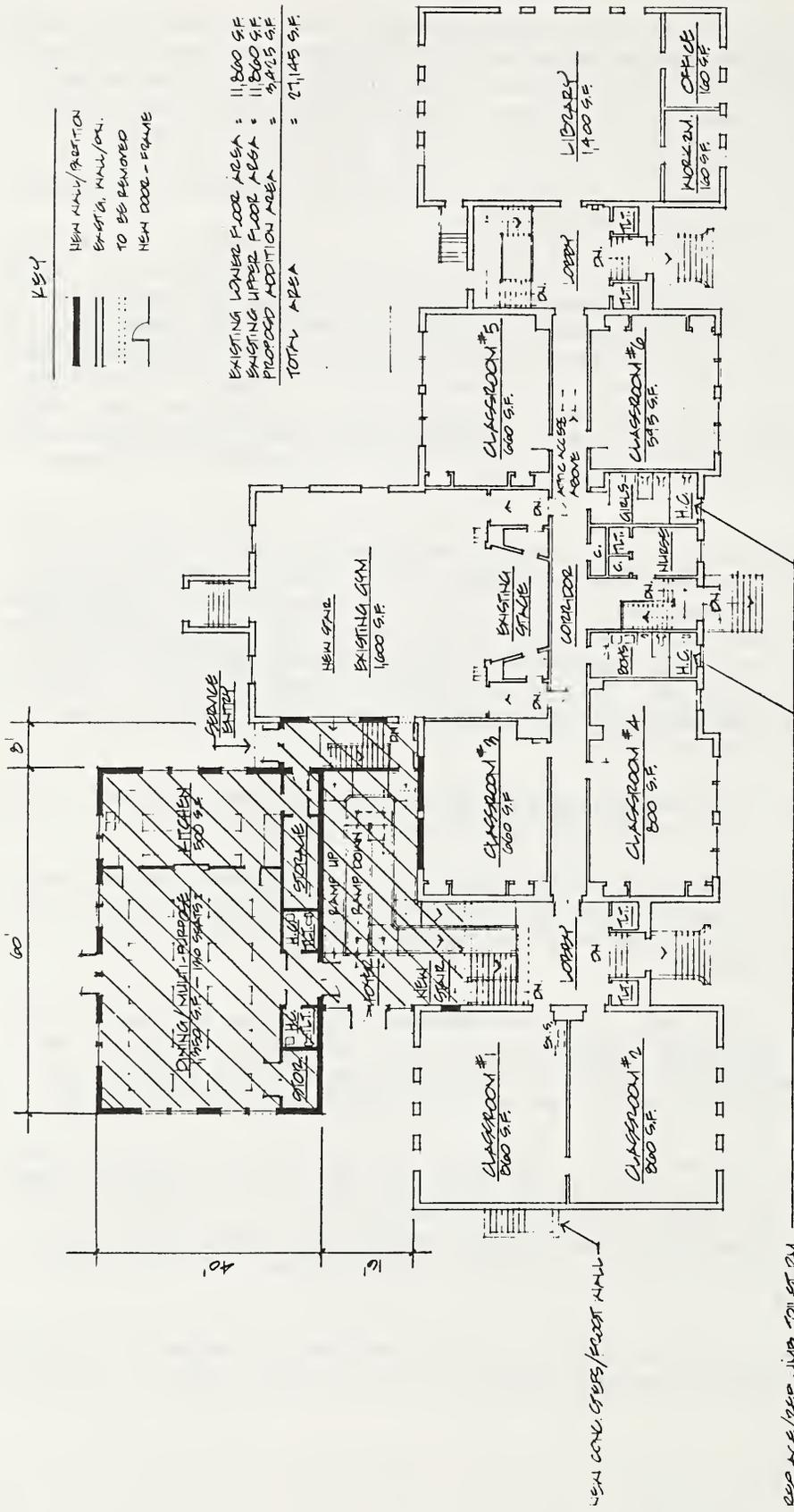
The school is presently unable to accommodate a handicapped student. It is time to make the school handicapped accessible.

Space needs are an important consideration. Renovating the new wings downstairs would alleviate the classroom crowding. This would also provide space to accommodate mandated programs such as art, speech and guidance.

The kitchen has been cited for numerous fire code and sanitation violations, including exposed sewer pipes, deteriorating walls and lack of a handwashing sink. The dining area is below grade level where children in kindergarten and first grade are not permitted.

The committee recommends renovating the school to increase classroom space. This would include finishing off the 1966 addition downstairs for classrooms, bringing the whole school up to today's fire code regulations, improving the heating system, making the school handicapped accessible and building a new kitchen and dining area at ground level.

As members of this community we have strived to upgrade the school, continue to provide quality education and also make this an affordable project.

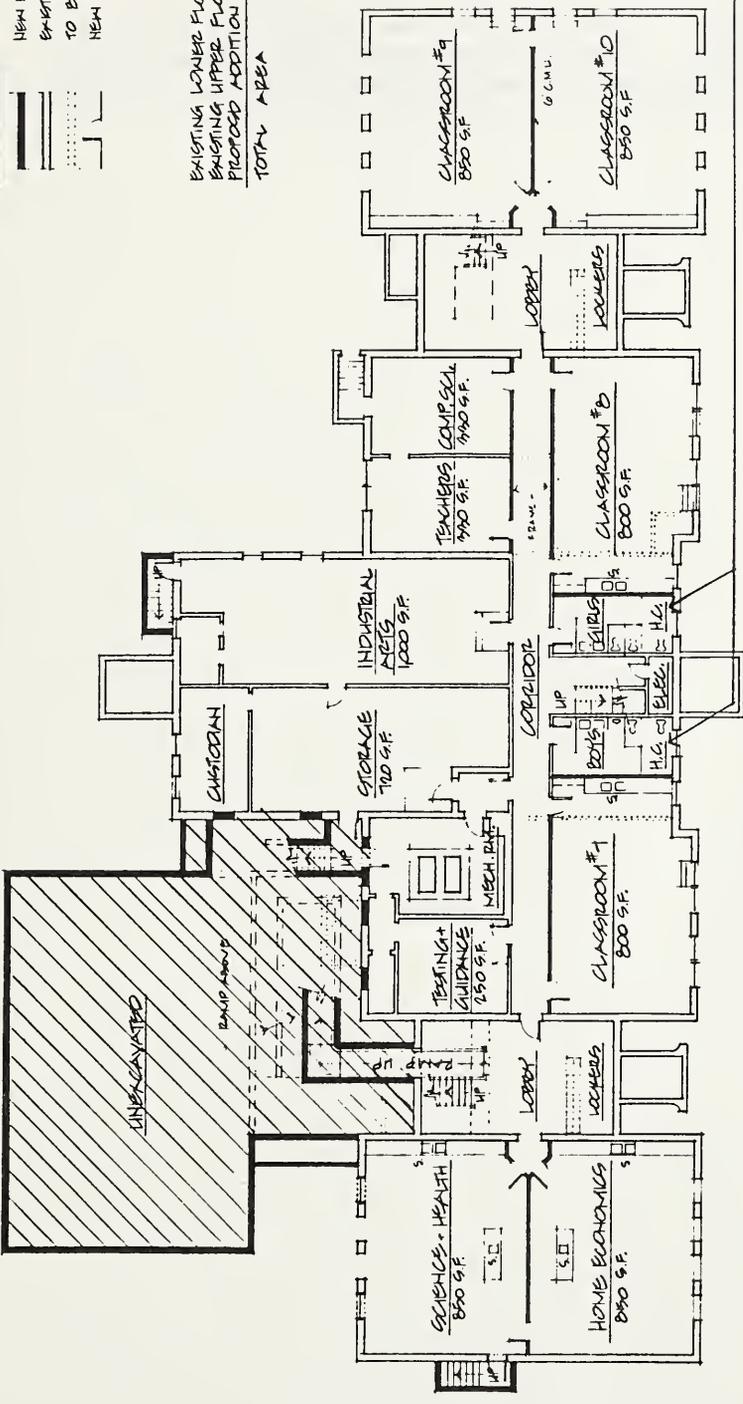
