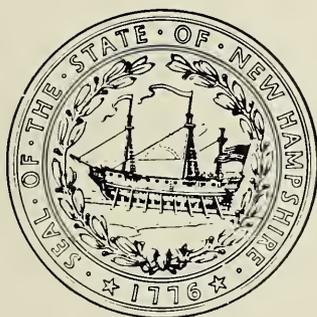

MARCH 9, 1993

Meeting called to order by Moderator Leslie Morrison at 7:40 P.M.

Moderator Leslie Morrison read the results of the voting, noting that 50% of the voters voted today.

**ARTICLE 2.** Motion made by Merle Jones Jr. to accept as written, seconded by Frederick Dolch. No discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

**ARTICLE 3.** Motion by Larkin Burrill to accept as written, seconded by Gerard LaFlamme. No discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

**ARTICLE 4.** Motion made by Merle Jones Jr. to accept as written, seconded by George Cobb. No discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

**ARTICLE 5.** Motion made by Helen Clement to accept as written, seconded by Sally Dimick. No discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passes.

**ARTICLE 6.** Motion made by Bernard Bradshaw to accept the reports as given, seconded by Priscilla Powers. Bernard Bradshaw presented

Amy J. Burrill a plaque for 19 years of service as Monroe Public Librarian, on her behalf, this award was accepted by her husband Larkin Burrill.

Maynard Farr presented a plaque to Keith Merchand in recognition of his many years of service to Monroe Fire Department. Bernard Bradshaw talked about how our recycling program is running, he reminded the people to rinse and crush the milk jugs. Merle Jones Jr., Chairman of the Budget Committee, gave an explanation of the Budget Committee's recommendations. Discussion on how and why these figures were reached. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

**ARTICLE 7.** Motion made by Glenn Wagner to accept as written, seconded by Maynard Farr. Explanation given by Glenn Wagner in support of this article. He gave a a break-down of how the money was intended to be used: \$2400.00 for equipment, \$1000.00 for training, \$300.00 to replenish supplies, and \$300.00 for misc. expenses. Discussion. Keith Merchand stated that he felt there was no need for it. Bruce Frazer asked if we would eventually have to have our own ambulance? He was told no. Gerry LaFlamme asked what type of training the members of the team would need? First Responder and CPR. More discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

**ARTICLE 8.** Motion made by Maynard Farr to accept as written, seconded by Glenn Wagner. Explanation given by Mr. Farr that this vehicle would serve a double purpose, it would carry excess fire equipment and also carry the "First Responder" equipment. Denis Ward asked what would happen to the Forestry Van? Maynard Farr answered that it would go back to the State. More discussion. Keith Merchand expressed his opinion that we did not need it. C.H. Dana questioned if \$6,000.00 would be enough? Yes was answered. Helen Clement, "Let's vote." Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

**ARTICLE 9.** Motion made by Merle Jones Jr. to accept as written, seconded by George Cobb. Bernard Bradshaw gave a short explanation of why the Selectmen felt that this position should be an appointed position instead of elected. Discussion held. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

Bernard Bradshaw gave a short explanation that article 10 was to close the Sewer Contingency Fund and that articles 11-15 are the results of that fund money being used plus a \$23,000.00 insurance refund from legal fees in the lawsuit with SOS.

**ARTICLE 10.** Motion made by Bernard Bradshaw to accept as written, seconded by Sally Dimick. No discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

**ARTICLE 11.** Motion made by Glenn Wagner to accept as written, seconded by Helen Clement. Bernard Bradshaw explained that this would put the Town Truck on a five year replacement schedule, this would be an on-going fund. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

**ARTICLE 12.** Motion made by Bernard Bradshaw to accept as written, seconded by George Cobb. Bernard Bradshaw explained that the amount being asked for was \$35,000.00 for a Highway Loader, set up similarly in an on-going fund. Some discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 13. Motion made by P.J. Blanchard to accept as written, seconded by Glenn Wagner. The amount requested was corrected to \$44,322.00 for a Fire Truck. Maynard Farr explained that by the year 2000 the Fire Department would have to replace a truck. Bernard Bradshaw explained that this would also be an on-going fund. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 14. Motion made by George Cobb to accept as written, seconded by Maynard Farr. Short explanation given by Bernard Bradshaw. Gerry LaFlamme inquired if a building committee could be set up for this? An ammendment made to the motion by Gerry LaFlamme to form a building committee, seconded by Merle Jones, Jr.. The ammendment was than with-drawn by Gerry LaFlamme. The original motion voted on, voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 15. Motion made by Merle Jones Jr. to accept as written, seconded by Alice Frazer. Bernard Bradshaw explained that this needs to be done. Betty Ward asked if this would include repairs also? Yes. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 16. Motion made by Larkin Burrill to accept as written, seconded by Merle Jones Jr. No discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 17. Motion made by Bernard Bradshaw to accept as written, seconded by Merle Jones Jr.. Bernard Bradshaw gave the figure of \$431,153.89 be raised. Some discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 18. To transact any other business that may come before said meeting.

Gerard LaFlamme made the motion to form a Building Committee for the Municipal Highway and Fire Department Building, this committee to consist of nine (9) people; three selectmen, 1 Fire Department representative, 1 Town Crew representative, and four community members. Merle Jones Jr. seconded the motion. Gerry LaFlamme made an ammendment to his motion, changing the 4 community members to 4 volunteers from the community. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed. Mr. Morrison told any interested volunteers for this committee to send a letter of interest to the Moderator or the Selectmen within the next month.

Bernard Bradshaw thanked Dennis Bouffard for his 3 years of service to the town as a Selectman.

Keith Merchand questioned whether the Town would want to convert the Monroe Clinic to a Town Office Building? Wasn't the Town Hall crowded? No discussion.

Helen Clement made the motion to adjourn, seconded by Sally Dimick. Meeting adjourned at 8:57 P.M..

Members of the Board:

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the Town of Monroe, N.H. for the year ended December 31, 1992 we considered the Town's internal control structure to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance of the internal control structure.

However, during our audit we became aware of the following conditions that should be corrected in order to strengthen internal controls and operating efficiency. This letter does not affect our report dated July 8, 1993 on the financial statements of the Town of Monroe, N.H.

Our following remarks are being made in the hope that they will improve existing procedure and are in no way a criticism of Town personnel.

1. Tax Lien Procedure.

At the 1992 Town Meeting, the Town adopted the provisions of RSA 80:58-86 for real estate tax lien procedure to be effective April 1, 1992. The lien has not been executed as of our audit date of July 8, 1993.

Recommendation

The lien must be executed within 18 months of the real estate tax assessment. Every step required by the RSA's must be followed exactly to ensure that the lien can be enforced and that any deeds executed as a result of the lien process are legal.

2. Voucher System

During the course of our audit, we had a difficult time performing the detail test of cash disbursements because of the following reasons:

1. Voucher numbers did not coincide with the check number and the voucher numbers were not recorded on the check.
2. Invoices were not filed in an orderly manner and several invoices could not be located.

Recommendation

The Town may implement a manifest system for the Selectmen

to authorize payments after reviewing the invoices or backup documents. All invoices should be attached to the manifest for easy access.

3. Library Fund

We spent additional time auditing the Library Fund since the invoices or backup documents were not filed in a proper order.

Recommendation

The Library Fund needs to implement a voucher or manifest system for the approval of payment by authorized personnel. This would enhance the control over the Library Fund.

4. Tax Collector's Records

During the course of our audit of the Tax Collector's records we found the following conditions that need to be improved upon.

- a. There were some discrepancies in cash receipts between the Treasurer's and Tax Collector's book.
- b. The blotter book has not been updated on a timely basis. As of July 8, 1993 none of the 1993 cash receipts have been posted.
- c. No formal abatement documents were prepared for the Selectmen to approve.
- d. The Tax Collector's cash receipts are not being remitted to the Treasurer on a timely basis.

Recommendation

- a. A monthly reconciliation of cash receipts should be performed by the Tax Collector and Treasurer so that any discrepancies could be resolved immediately.
- b. As the taxes are paid, the blotter book should be updated so that outstanding tax balances would be available at any time.
- c. The Selectmen should approve the abatements by signing a formal document noting the explanation for the change in tax.
- d. Tax Collector receipts must be remitted to the Treasurer weekly or whenever the amount is over \$500.00, in accordance with State Statutes.

We extend our thanks to the officials and employees of the Town for their assistance during the course of our audit.

## NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL 1993 REPORT

1993 has been a busy year for North Country Council. Our membership stands at forty-four communities, representing 99 percent of the region's population.

The year has been major successes under the Councils' senior staff leadership: David Beauchesne, Regional Planning Coordinator; Cathy Conway, Civil Engineering Coordinator; Claire Douglass, Community Planning Coordinator; and Liz Ward, Small Business Development Coordinator. This team has supervised project that run the gamut from master planning and sewer system designs to traffic corridor planning, GIS mapping, and micro-enterprise lending. Marghie Seymour, our Solid Waste Planner, continues to provide valuable assistance to the region's solid waste management districts and Sharon Penny, Transportation Planner, has been providing the support and guidance for the Council's ISTEPA Transportation Planning Program. This new program will give NCC members a much greater say in how the New Hampshire Department of Transportation prioritizes transportation construction activities in the North Country in the future.

Other activities completed this year include the third annual business survey, the North Country Ingenuity Fair, household hazardous waste collections, wood products market development planning, business counseling, regionwide computerized wetlands mapping, Northern Forest Lands representation, floodzone management, completion of an industrial environmental site assessment, completion of feasibility studies for industrial development, design of solid waste transfer stations, implementation of the rural plastics recycling program, and regional telecommunications system planning.

In October, the Council celebrated its 20th anniversary year of service to the region with a gathering of former board members, friends, community representatives and staffers in Franconia, our old home town.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

During Calendar Year 1993 the State of New Hampshire experienced an average number of wildfires. The three leading causes of these wildfires were campfires left unattended, unsupervised children and debris fires that escaped control. All of these fires are preventable, but ONLY with your help!

Please help your town and state forest fire officials with forest fire prevention. New Hampshire State Law (RSA 224:27 II) requires that, "No person, firm or corporation shall kindle or cause to be kindled any fire or burn or cause to be burned any material in the open, except when ground is covered with snow, without first obtaining a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden of the town where the burning is to be done."

Violations of RSA 224:27 II and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$1,000 and/or a year in jail and you are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

The State of New Hampshire, Division of Forest and Lands assisted many towns in wildland fire suppression during 1993 and participated in many fire prevention programs. This year, the nation is celebrating Smokey Bear's 50th anniversary. The State of New Hampshire Forest Protection Bureau will be working with many communities to spread the fire prevention message--"Remember--ONLY YOU can prevent forest fires. Fire prevention is the most cost effective fire suppression tool. Please be careful around fire and help us and our communities have a fire safe year.

**NORTH COUNTRY HOME HEALTH AGENCY  
1993 TOWN REPORT**

The North Country Home Health Agency is a not-for-profit home care agency, founded in 1971, providing acute care and a long term care option at home to support patients and families in meeting health care needs. Care is provided pre-and post-hospitalization and as an alternative to residential long-term care.

The Agency's philosophy is that health care should be community based, patient and family centered, support and empower the individual and prioritize the least restrictive care alternatives.

In the Agency's service area (Northern Grafton and Southern Coos counties) 590 clients received 35,000 home visits representing 56,000 hours of care. 12 residents of the Town of Monroe received 905 visits as follows:

Nursing 90  
Home Health Aide 519  
Physical Therapy 141  
Companion 155 (565 Hours)

Over 1700 individuals were served at Agency sponsored influenza immunization, blood pressure, blood sugar and foot care clinics.

75- 80 individuals are employed, representing 47-50 full-time equivalent employees.

A major expansion of services is forthcoming in 1994; the agency will seek Medicare Hospice Certification, which will assist persons with a terminal illness and their families by providing specialized benefits. A New Hampshire Charitable Foundation grant was received by the agency to support the development of hospice services.

The Agency raised \$40,689 through voluntary contributions during 1993, and offered \$98,281 in free and subsidized care to individuals and families. Voluntary funds were generated by individual donations, memorials, the annual appeal, the golf tournament and the casino night.

Combining the efforts and energy of a dedicated staff, the agency recruited numerous volunteers (consisting of board members and community residents) who contributed over 2200 volunteer hours.

## GRAFTON SENIOR CITIZENS COUNCIL 1993 REPORT

Grafton County Senior Citizens Council, Inc. provides services to older residents of Monroe through Haverhill Area Senior Services and the Littleton Area Senior Center. These services include home delivered meals, a senior dining room program, transportation, outreach and social work services, health education, recreation, information and referral, as well as opportunities for older individuals to be of service to their communities through volunteering.

Any Monroe resident over the age of 60 or members of his/her family are eligible to use the services of GCSCC. Handicapped individuals under the age of 60 may also be served through these programs. Although there are no charges for the services, the Agency does request contributions toward the cost of services.

During 1993, 10 Monroe residents were served through all of GCSCC's programs. These individuals enjoyed dinners in the senior dining rooms, received hot meals delivered to their homes, used transportation services to travel to medical appointments, to grocery stores, to do personal errands, participated in recreational and educational programs or used our information and referral service, or the services of our social worker. Services for Monroe Residents were instrumental in supporting many of these individuals as they attempted to remain independent in their own homes despite physical frailties.

Our staff works closely with other agencies providing services to older people in the community, to assist older Monroe Residents and their families in taking advantage of available programs and services which will improve the quality of their lives and enable them to remain in their own community.

Through the years, GCSCC has very much appreciated the support of the Monroe Community for services which enhance the independence of older residents of Monroe.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Monroe in the County of Grafton in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at Monroe Town Hall in said Monroe on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at 7:00 of the clock in the evening to act upon the following subjects: with School business preceeding Town business meeting:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. (By Ballot)
2. Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 31:95-b providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the selectmen to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal, or other governmental unit or private source which becomes available during the fiscal year? This authorization will remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the municipal meeting. (Majority vote required).
3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to convey any real estate acquired by the town by Tax Collector's deed. Such conveyance shall be by deed following a public auction, or the property may be sold by advertised sealed bids, or may be otherwise disposed of as justice may require, pursuant to RSA 80:58-86.
4. To see if the municipality will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property, other than cash, to the municipality for any public purposes. This authorization in accordance with RSA 31:95-e shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the municipal meeting. (Majority vote required).
5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell to the highest bidder or at public auction excess town vehicles or any other excess equipment owned by the town, upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen may deem appropriate.
6. Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 202-A:4-c providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the public library trustees to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year? (Majority vote required).
7. "Shall we adopt the provision of RSA 72:28, V and VI for an optional Veterans' exemption and an expanded qualifying war service for Veterans seeking the exemption?" The optional Veterans' exemption is \$100., rather than \$50.. (By petition) (By Ballot)
8. "Shall we adopt the provision of RSA 72:35, IV for an optional property tax exemption on residential property for a service-connected total disability?" The optional disability exemption is \$1,400., rather than \$700.. (By petition) (By Ballot)

9. To see if the town will install 1 (one) new street light-Henry Hartford, Sunset Drive.
10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to remove non-essential street lights.
11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of money in the amount of \$35,000.00 to pave the roads of Mountain View Drive and Pine Hill Road. The Selectmen and Budget Committee do not recommend this appropriation. (By petition)

The School Administrative Unit is undergoing some significant changes. In August, Assistant Superintendent of Schools Dr. Keith Pfeifer resigned to become Superintendent of Schools in SAU #62, Enfield, N.H. Dr. Pfeifer worked primarily in the Lincoln-Woodstock, Piermont, Warren and Benton School Districts and was the prime architect of our curriculum development and revision process. Recently Mary Vigue, Federal Projects, Chapter I and Gifted and Talented Coordinator also resigned to become the Federal Projects Coordinator for the city of Manchester N.H. Both were excellent members of our administrative team and both will be greatly missed. The SAU #23 Board in an effort to reduce administrative costs decided not to replace Dr. Pfeifer and to hire a part time Chapter I Coordinator, utilizing only federal grant money. The majority of the Board felt that due to the difficult economic times Dr. Pfeifer's and Mrs. Vigue's responsibilities had to be spread between Superintendent McDonald and Assistant Superintendent Nelson. As a result, although each will continue to work in all seven school districts, Dr. McDonald will have primary responsibility for the SAU budget and staff; professional and support staff negotiations in Lincoln-Woodstock and Haverhill, and for the Benton, Lincoln-Woodstock, Piermont, and Warren School Districts. Ms. Nelson will have primary responsibility for professional staff negotiations in Bath and Monroe; State and Federal grants; and for the Bath, Monroe, and Haverhill Cooperative School Districts. Both will continue to be involved in curriculum development and assessment, staff development, and the improvement of instruction. One immediate impact that will effect the Monroe School District is that I will be unable to attend your school district meeting this year. Unfortunately Benton's school district meeting is held at the same time and I will have to go there. In the past Dr. Pfeifer attended the Benton meeting so that I could attend the Monroe meeting.

In November the Lincoln-Woodstock Cooperative School Board voted to request that the New Hampshire Department of Education lift the moratorium on the creation of new SAU's to allow them to withdraw from SAU #23 and create their own School Administrative Unit. The Lin-Wood School Board argued that they could hire their own Superintendent and SAU staff for about the same amount of money they presently contribute to SAU #23. This January, the State Board of Education lifted the moratorium. While the State Board has not made a decision on Lincoln-Woodstock's request, similar requests have been successful in the past. If Lincoln-Woodstock is permitted to establish its own SAU for the 1995-1996 school year the remaining districts

will be impacted financially, since Lincoln-Woodstock contributes over 37% of the School Administrative budget.

A new addition to the area, the Haverhill Higher Education Center, is now in full operation at Woodsville High School. The center will offer general education courses as well as some certificate and degree programs. The N.H. Technical College at Berlin, the School for Life Long Learning (UNH) and Plymouth State College will all be offering programs and courses. We are very excited about the opportunities the center has to offer and appreciate the support of our state representatives and the Haverhill Economic Development Council. Without their assistance, the center would not have come into existence to serve our communities. We invite Monroe residents to stop by and meet Ms. Kathleen Tiews, the new director, or call her at 747-2565 or 1-800-445-4525 to see if our programs will meet your needs.

This year four individuals in the SAU received special recognition. Wayne Fortier, Chair of both the SAU and Haverhill School Boards was recognized by the New Hampshire School Administrators Association as their first Champion for Children. Mr. Fortier was selected for his leadership and his contributions to the education and welfare of children. Jane Slayton, Piermont Village School Principal, was selected as the N. H. Elementary Principal of the Year by the New Hampshire Association of School Principals. In October she was presented with the National Distinguished Principal Award in Washington, D.C. Helen Joyce, Assistant Principal, Woodsville High School was selected by the New Hampshire Association of School Principals as the N.H. Assistant Principal of the Year. Mrs. Joyce will be nationally recognized in Chicago, Illinois this winter. Dr. Douglas McDonald, Superintendent of Schools was selected, in February, 1993 as one of the Executive Educator 100 by the Executive Educator Magazine. He was recognized for making a significant difference in the schools within SAU #23.

In closing I would like to thank the citizens of Monroe for your continuing support. We have made a lot of positive changes in our schools over the last seven years and this could not have happened without the commitment and support of the school board, administration, faculty, staff and most importantly the community. It has been a pleasure to work in your community and I am confident that our schools will continue to move forward in the coming years.

What a difference a year makes. I can report to you with confidence that our educational programs are thriving under the leadership of eight of the best principals in the state. Along with Dr. McDonald, Phyllis McKenna, our Special Education Director, and Shaun Donahue, our Drug and Alcohol Abuse Prevention Coordinator, we work as an administrative team to share ideas and set priorities for the SAU. Two new principals and a new assistant principal have joined the team this year: Sharlene Tracy, Principal, and Bob St. Pierre, Assistant Principal, of Haverhill Cooperative Middle School, and Michael Foxall, Principal of Warren Village School. They are holding their own among a group of very talented co-workers. In fact, the high level of professionalism, dedication and general good sense of our school leaders is impressive to witness. Fortunately for me, I get to see it often as I travel about the SAU. Our schools are in very capable hands.

Collaborative projects begun a year ago continue to thrive. Five computer courses have been completed under the sponsorship of the School-Business Partnership, a joint SAU #23/Haverhill Economic Coordinating Council (HECC) project. Lin-Wood School is adapting this computer training model for its school community. The Haverhill Higher Education Center, housed at Woodsville High School, is open for business, with several college courses scheduled for the spring. The Success by Six Collaborative, made up of medical professionals, social agencies, the Cooperative Extension, HECC and SAU #23, is learning how to coordinate to support families with young children in our region.

Collaboration has helped us realize how much we share in common. We are all committed to preserving the strengths of our rural region: excellent schools, economically viable communities, and strong families. By pooling our resources and communicating regularly with one another, we can "do more with less." A year in the North Country has taught me the truth of that phrase.

Since we have promised brevity in our report this year, I'll refrain from listing every interesting project that is underway or planned. Instead, I urge you to visit our schools, talk with the principal, teachers and staff, and see your tax dollars at work first hand. I think you'll be pleased. Finally, I extend another year's thank you to colleagues, neighbors and friends throughout SAU #23 whose good humor, wisdom and patience continue to make work in the North Country a special privilege.

One-half of the School Administrative Unit expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the Unit on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30. The Superintendent of SAU #23 during the 1993-94 school year will receive a salary of \$71,350.00 prorated among the several school districts. The Assistant Superintendents will receive salaries of \$58,000.00 and \$53,500 prorated among the several school districts.
