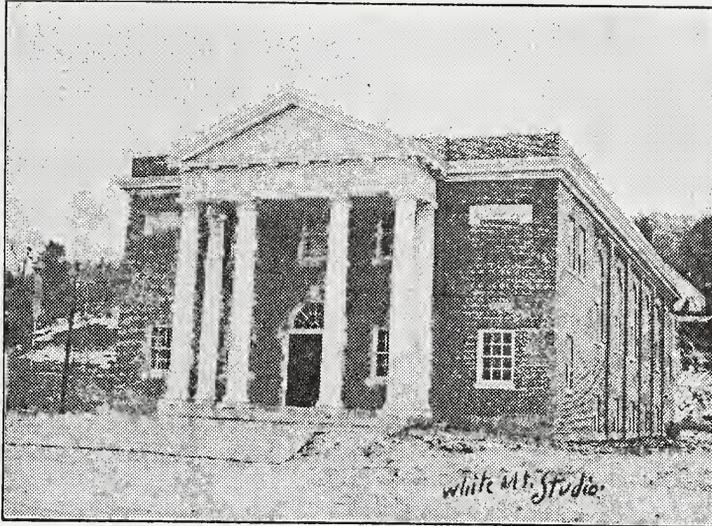

Moderator Leslie Morrison read the results of the voting and declared the winners of each office.

ARTICLE 2. Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 31:95-b providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the selectmen to apply for, accept

and expend, without further action by town meeting unanticipated money from a state, federal, or other governmental unit or private source which becomes available during the fiscal year? This authorization will remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the municipal meeting. (Majority vote required). Motion made by Denis Ward to accept as written, seconded by George Cobb. No discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to convey any real estate acquired by the town by Tax Collector's deed. Such conveyance shall be by deed following a public auction, or the property may be sold by advertised sealed bids, or may be otherwise disposed of as justice may require, pursuant to RSA 80:58-86. "So moved" by Bernard Bradshaw, seconded by Merle Jones. Merle Jones made a request to amend this article by adding the following words to read after RSA 80:58-86, "shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the municipal meeting. (Majority vote required)" Seconded by Bernard Bradshaw. The Moderator explained that some of the wording had been left out of this article. Voice vote held on the amending of this article by adding the additional words, voice vote in the affirmative, the amendment passes. No discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the municipality will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to accept gifts of personal property, other than cash, to the municipality for any public purposes. This authorization in accordance with RSA 31:95-e shall remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the municipal meeting. (Majority vote required). "I so move", by Bernard Bradshaw, seconded by Merle Jones, Jr. No discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell to the highest bidder or at public auction excess town vehicles or any other excess equipment owned by the town, upon such terms and conditions as the Selectmen may deem appropriate. Motion made by Gerard LaFlamme to accept as written, seconded by Carl Lawrence. No discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 6. Shall the town accept the provisions of RSA 202-A:4-c providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the public library trustees to apply for, accept and expend, without further action by the town meeting, unanticipated money from a state, federal, or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the fiscal year? (Majority vote required) Motion made by Tom Bedell to accept as written, seconded by Merle Jones Jr.. No discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 7. "Shall we adopt the provision of RSA 72:28, V and VI for an optional Veterans' exemption and an expanded qualifying war service for Veterans seeking the exemption?" The optional Veterans' exemption is \$100., rather than \$50.. (By petition) (By ballot) A motion was made by Carl Lawrence to pass over this article, but Mr. Morrison explained that we cannot make a motion because this question was on the ballot for voting during the day. **NO** 76 votes **YES** 116, article passes.

ARTICLE 8. "Shall we adopt the provision of RSA 72:35 IV for an optional property tax exemption on residential property for a service-connected total disability?" The optional disability exemption is

\$1,400., rather than \$700.. (By petition) (By ballot)

NO 111 **YES** 79 The article is defeated.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the town will install 1 (one) new street light-Henry Hartford, Sunset Drive. Motion made by Keith Merchand to pass over this article, seconded by Carl Lawrence. Voice vote in the affirmative, this article is passed over.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to remove non-essential street lights. Motion made by Gerry LaFlamme, seconded by Denis Ward. Discussion: Alice Frazer asked for an explanation of what non-essential street lights are? Bernard Bradshaw explained that the Budget Committee brought this subject up at Budget hearing time, pointing out that there are several street lights in town that are not serving any purpose at all, such as lighting a cluster of trees. This article would enable the selectmen to take out the street lights that serve no purpose. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of money in the amount of \$35,000. to pave the roads of Mountain View Drive and Pine Hill Road. The Selectmen and Budget Committee do not recommend this appropriation. (By petition) Motion made by Laura Crane, seconded by Mike D'elia. Some discussion, Laura pointed out that this is not the first time this has been brought to the people. The voice vote was indecisive, therefore was voted by a show of hands. **YES 25 NO 42;** the motion and article defeated.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,800. to put new siding on the Monroe Public Library. The Selectmen and Budget Committee do not recommend this appropriation. Gerry LaFlamme made the motion to pass over this article, seconded by Keith Merchand. Voice vote in the affirmative, this article passed over.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate up to the sum of \$7,000. to be added to the Highway Department Truck Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the use/transfer of the December 31, 1993 fund balance in that amount for this purpose. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this article. (Majority vote required) Motion made by Bernard Bradshaw, seconded by Merle Jones. Discussion: Mr. Bradshaw explained that due to a change in the laws, we can use this method to use money left-over from last year, by vote of this meeting. In the past the left over money was put into the General Fund, but now we can do it this way. Denis ward asked if we were raising additional money? No, using left-over from 1993. Gerry LaFlamme wanted more explanation of how much extra money was being talked about, he was answered \$30,000.. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate up to the sum of \$7,000. to be added to the Highway Department Loader Capital Reserve Fund and authorize the use/transfer of the December 31, 1993 fund balance in that amount for this purpose. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this article. (Majority vote required) Motion made by George Cobb, seconded by Gerry LaFlamme. No discussion, voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate up to the sum of \$10,000. to be added to the Fire Truck Capital

Reserve Fund and authorize the use/transfer of the December 31, 1993 fund balance in that amount for this purpose. The selectmen and the Budget committee recommend this article. (Majority vote required) Motion made by Gerry LaFlamme, seconded by Tom Bedell. No discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000. to be added to the Municipal Highway and Fire Department Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen and Budget committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required) Motion made by Gerry LaFlamme, seconded by Sally Dimick. Mr. Bradshaw explained that this money would be raised, rather than transferred as in earlier articles. Gerry LaFlamme, Chairman of the Building Committee, gave a short report of what the building committee was doing at the moment, such as feasibility of different ideas, requirements, etc. No discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 17. To hear all reports of Committees and Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
Maynard Farr: explained the Fast Squad, 12 people took the course, 11 passed the test, the other one will take the test later, she was unable due to illness. The Fast Squad officially went "on-line" on January 1, 1994. They purchased a used ambulance for \$5,000.. In order to call for the Fast Squad, call the same phone number as you would for the Fire Department or ambulance. No other reports. Motion made by Bernard Bradshaw to accept all reports as printed, seconded by Priscilla Powers. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 18. Shall the town accept the provision of RSA 33:7 providing that any town at an annual meeting may adopt an article authorizing indefinitely, until specific rescission of such authority, the Selectmen to issue tax anticipation notes? (Majority vote required) Motion made by Helen Clement, seconded by Priscilla Powers. Denis Ward requested an explanation. Bernard Bradshaw explained that we used to have to do this every year, but once this article is passed we won't have to vote on this article every year. No further discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 19. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same. Bernard Bradshaw made the motion that we raise the sum of \$422,612.00 which excludes already passed articles, seconded by Merle Jones Jr.. The appropriations are as follows:

Mr. Bradshaw explained that this figure may differ from the figures published in the projected budget, every appropriation has to be listed, even those going into capital reserve funds from money left from the past year. Gerry LaFlamme, Chairman of the Budget Committee, questioned if the Budget Committee's recommendations were considered? Mr. Bradshaw answered "Yes, but the Selectmen still felt that the appropriations they requested were necessary." More discussion, Moderator Leslie Morrison advised the people that due to a change in laws, that these appropriations could be voted on line by line, if desired. Gerry LaFlamme went thru the Budget Committee's 1994 recommendations, explaining why the suggested cuts were made. No further discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 20. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Mr. Bradshaw spoke briefly about our recycling program. There are 3-4 loads of aluminum cans being recycled each year, the plastic milk and soda jugs are going more frequently, and the newspaper recycling is going well also. He stressed that it is important to remove the caps of milk and soda plastic jugs, and to also rinse them and crush the milk jugs; if the people don't do the crushing, then Butch must do it before they are accepted for recycling. The Selectmen have looked at some literature on metal recycling, but at the moment it does not seem to be cost effective. George Cobb inquired about recycling glass. The town has no plans to recycle glass at this time.

Motion made by Helen Clement to adjourn this meeting, seconded by Sally Dimick. Meeting adjourned at 8:12 P.M..

Members of the Board:

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the Town of Monroe, New Hampshire for the year ended December 31, 1993 we considered the Town's internal control structure to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance of the internal control structure.

However, during our audit we became aware of the following conditions that should be corrected in order to strengthen internal controls and operating efficiency. This letter does not affect our report dated July 13, 1994 on the financial statements of the Town of Monroe, New Hampshire.

Our following remarks are being made in the hope that they will improve existing procedures and are in no way a criticism of Town personnel.

1. Segregation of Duties

Presently, the Town Treasurer who is responsible for the custody of Town funds also handles the bookkeeping function, including, in 1994, the new computerized accounting system.

Recommendation

The Town may consider appointing the current Treasurer to the position of Administrative Assistant and finding a new treasurer, as the current treasurer has been performing the functions of the Administrative Assistant and is already familiar with the Town's daily activities. This would enhance the Town's internal control structure.

Dual Signatures on the Checks

Presently, the Town Treasurer's signature is the only one required on Town checks.

Recommendation

We recommend all checks be co-signed by at least one selectman after careful examination of the supporting documents.

Bank Reconciliation of Library Fund

No formal year end bank reconciliation of the library fund was prepared.

Recommendation

The library Treasurer should prepare an accurate bank reconciliation on a monthly basis in order to control and safeguard the use of the fund.

Recordkeeping of Water Revenue

During our review of the water billing cards, we noted that several accounts had credit balances due to over payments. The Town did not prepare a summary list for accounts receivable and deferred revenue at the end of the year.

Recommendation

The Town should improve the recordkeeping for water revenue to present accurate current water revenue, accounts receivable and deferred revenues at the year end.

Tax Collector Records

During the course of our audit of the Tax Collector's records we found the following conditions that need to be corrected:

- a. Copies were not retained by the Tax Collector of the following: his report to the state; the tax lien registered with the county; or notification of taxpayer and of mortgagee of intent to lien.
- b. The Tax Collector's report omitted properties that were liened by the Town.
- c. Numerous errors were noted in the tax lien performed in 1993:
 1. Clerical errors were found in the detail of the tax lien, the amount of unpaid tax lien, computation of the amount paid by the Town to the Tax Collector for the lien, and interest charged after lien.
 2. Collections against tax liens are not being recorded correctly.

3. No detailed accounts receivable list was prepared at year end.
 4. Liens are not being released within thirty days of payment in full as required by state statute.
- d. Errors were noted in the list of taxes receivable at December 31, 1993 when compared with the Tax Collectors blotter and the total accounts receivable at year end did not agree with the Tax Collector's year end report.
 - e. Interest is not being charged on a consistent basis on late payment of taxes.
 - f. There were discrepancies in cash receipts between the Treasurer's and Tax Collector's books.
 - g. The blotter book has not been updated on a timely basis. As of the date of our audit none of 1994's cash receipts had been posted.
 - h. No formal abatement documents were prepared for the selectmen to approve.

Recommendation

The Tax Collector should retain copies of all reports filed with the state and county and all documents relating to the tax lien procedure. He should familiarize himself with the laws and regulations that dictate the procedures to be followed by a tax collector and he should perform and review his work on a timely basis to ensure clerical accuracy.

We extend our thanks to the officials and employees for their assistance during the course of our audit.

**ANNUAL REPORT OF THE MONROE F.A.S.T.SQUAD
01-01-94 to 12-31-94**

The Monroe F.A.S.T. Squad officially began operating on January 1, 1994. During the year, we responded to 21 calls of the following types.

12---Medical Emergencies
5---Trauma
3---Motor Vehicle Accidents
1---Assist to Fire Department

In December of last year, eight of our members completed training necessary to become Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT's). This higher competency level is not mandated for our service, and was therefore sought on a voluntary basis at the students' own expense. As a result, we expect our squad to include ten certified EMT's for the 1995 calendar year.

I should point out that your F.A.S.T. Squad is not a Transporting service. Its purpose is to provide emergency pre-hospital care on scene and to prepare patients for transport via ambulance(usually Woodsville Ambulance Service). We feel this is an ideal situation for Monroe. Our local response means we can reach and treat patients sooner, while our arrangement with transporting services allows us to do so at no additional cost to the town. This is because all medical supplies used by the F.A.S.T. Squad are returned or replaced by the transporting ambulance service free of charge. As a result, we get the benefit of improved emergency medical services with no adverse affect on taxes. Based on our 1994 activity, we can estimate our call average at 1--2 responses per month. Unless and until that average can be measured in call per day, an upgrade to transporting service will not be considered.

I'm glad to be a member of the F.A.S.T. Squad and pleased with what we've accomplished in our first year. The squad looks forward to 1995 and a continued opportunity to provide emergency medical care for Monroe Residents.

Monroe Clinic has changed its operating hours to meet patient demand. More patients were requesting Thursday hours instead of Friday. The new hours are:

MONDAY 9a.m. to 5p.m.
TUESDAY 9a.m. to 5p.m.
WEDNESDAY 12:30p.m. to 7p.m.
THURSDAY 9a.m. to 4p.m.
FRIDAY 9a.m. to 1p.m.

There were 3023 patient encounters in 1994, an increase from 2723 in 1993. We have about 1300 patient charts that are active.

We are continuing to accept most insurance plans including the HMO's; Blue Choice; Mathew Thortan and Healthsource. These insurances require fire safety so some smoke detectors and emergency lighting had to be installed.

We have a billing service (PROCLAIMS) that does all the billing in an effective, timely manner.

We have our new phone which have been a great help to responding to the needs of patients. We continue to have problems with the electric heat not meeting our needs and the patients complaining about being cold.

Dr. DeFrahm participated in continuing medical education and completed a 3 year rotation for mandatory board certification.

REPORT OF TOWN FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

In calendar year 1994, our three (3) leading causes of fires were **NO PERMIT, CHILDREN** and **REKINDLES** or fires where the fire was not properly extinguished.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law, and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire are misdemeanors punishable by fines up to \$2,000.00 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

Report of 1994 Services

North Country Home Health Agency is a not-for-profit home care agency, founded in 1971, which provides an acute care and a long term care option at home to support patients and families in meeting health care needs. Care is provided before and after hospitalization and as an alternative to residential long-term care.

In 1994, after months of preparation, NCHHA became the first Medicare Certified Hospice provider 'north of the notches'. The Medicare Certified Hospice Program works in close collaboration with the volunteers from to provide a comprehensive plan of care and support for individuals and their families.

The quality and comprehensiveness of home care provided by NCHHA is the result of the hard work of a dedicated staff and Board. During 1994 a joint staff/Board committee developed (and the Board approved) the Agency's strategic plan, which is the 'blueprint for action' in the years ahead.

We look to the future with confidence, knowing that change is certain, some risk is inevitable, and that in numerous creative and exciting ways home care services will be a leader in addressing the health needs of the communities we serve.

During 1994 in the Agency's service area (Northern Grafton and Southern Coos Counties) 631 clients were cared for in 39,427 home visits. 22 residents of the Town of Monroe received 1273 visits as follows:

Over 1000 individuals received care at Agency sponsored influenza immunization, blood pressure, blood sugar and foot care clinics.

70-80 individuals are employed at NCHHA, representing 45-50 full time equivalent employees.

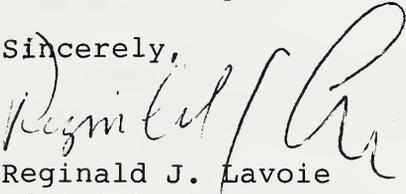

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL
1994 REPORT

The year 1994 has been a record project year for the Council. In 1994, we received approval for \$3 million of EDA Title I construction assistance for member towns and submitted a proposal for another \$1.5 million for a project in 1995. The \$4.5 million resulting from these projects will go a very long way toward development of jobs in three of the region's growth centers. We are working diligently to see another \$5 million investment in three other growth centers and development target areas over the next three years from EDA.

The Council's Transportation Planning program continues to grow in stature and accomplishments. In addition to completing a regional bike-pedestrian plan this year, we coordinated a regional transportation enhancement program which resulted in \$1 million worth of innovative transportation projects being funded in the North Country. We also provided major road and bridge technical assistance to eight towns in cooperation with NH DOT. Two additional towns received help with Road Surface Management Systems, bringing the total number of towns in the region with NCC RSMS programs to ten. This coming year will be busier than last with the assembly of our Regional Transportation Improvement Plan, Scenic Byways Initiative, Route 16 Corridor Study, Statewide Transportation Modeling Study and numerous local road and bridge projects.

In 1994 the Council hosted the second Annual Ingenuity Fair at Bretton Woods. The Fair showcased the products of 100 North Country manufacturers and was attended by 10,000 people. Our third Annual Business Conditions Survey was mailed to 3,000 businesses across the region. The results of the survey provided valuable insight into workers comp, credit availability, and general business conditions in the North Country. The fourth survey is being compiled at the time of this report.

The Council has also been involved in the design and development of three recreation facilities across the region and has provided engineering assistance for landfill closures, environmental site assessments, large septic projects, road drainage and realignment projects and water system installations in 12 different towns.

With funding from the Environmental Protection Agency the Council was able to digitize hydric soils and high altitude satellite image maps of wetlands for all 51 towns in the region. The maps were distributed gratis to all towns in the region. The Council provided floodplain management, and flood insurance technical assistance to 7 towns this year and provided over 600 hours of local planning technical assistance. We continued to provide circuit riding planning assistance to two municipalities.

Two multi-community programs were started, one involving four communities, to begin a dialogue of use of the Moore Reservoir and the Connecticut River, and the other involving twelve towns to look at cooperative economic development in the central part of the region. Community Development Block Grants were written for five towns and all the grants were funded.

The Council has accomplished all these projects (and many more that cannot be listed here due to space limitations), with a very small staff. We are committed to staying as lean as possible. Staff people on board that are available for regional activities are: Preston Gilbert, Executive Director; Cathy Conway, Engineering Coordinator; Claire Douglass, Planning Coordinator; James Steele, GIS Coordinator; Sharon Penney, Transportation Planner; Liz Ward, Small Business Development Coordinator, Berta Clark, Secretary; and Marghie Seymour, Solid Waste Consultant.

The Council is your organization. We are membership based, and we exist to respond to the needs of the region. On behalf of the Board of Directors, I want to thank you for your involvement and support. We're here as you need us.

GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS'
1994 REPORT

The Grafton County Commissioners are pleased to submit the following report to the citizens of Grafton County. Despite some major personnel changes during the past year, we have enjoyed a smooth transition, thanks in large part to the concerted efforts of our employees, including department heads, our administrative team, and the employee council.

After twenty-five years of service to the county, our Executive Director, Evelyn Smith, retired, effective December 31, 1993. Although she is sorely missed, her position has been ably filled by Ernie Towne, moving from Superintendent of Corrections, after an extensive search. His former post has been taken over by Sidney Bird, who joined us in April of 1994 after extensive corrections experience in Miami, Florida.

The resignation of Nursing Home Administrator John Richwagen necessitated the establishment of yet another search committee and review of résumés. In late November John Will migrated north from Massachusetts to join us as the Administrator of the Grafton County Nursing Home. During the nearly five month interval Office and Personnel Supervisor, Joanne Mann, did an outstanding job as Acting Administrator. Another change at the Nursing Home and Department of Corrections was the addition of Dr. David Fagan as Co-Medical Director, joining our long-time Medical Director, Dr. Harry Rowe.

Another change in personnel will be the succession, in January of 1995, of a new Commissioner from District 3, Steve Panagoulis of Plymouth, taking over Betty Jo Taffe's seat. Betty Jo, after many years' interest in and association with Grafton County, opted not to seek re-election in order to join her husband on his sabbatical. We shall miss her and wish her well, as we welcome Steve to his new responsibilities.

In November of 1993 construction of an expanded Special Needs Unit was completed at the Nursing Home and 20 residents moved into their new quarters. Family Day was held once again for Nursing Home residents and their families, and continues to be a huge success. It is one of the residents' favorite annual events. Also, during the year County Nursing Home employees rejected an attempt to unionize, opting instead to continue with the current employee council.

During FY 1994 Grafton County saw the completion of Phase I of the AHEAD, Inc. Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), used to purchase and renovate low and moderate income housing in the Littleton area, and made significant progress on Phase II.

In addition, the Office of State Planning notified the county that it had been awarded a two-year CDBG of one million dollars for the Whole Village Family Resource Center in the Plymouth area. Funds will be used to construct a facility which will house local human service agencies that work with children and families.

During early FY 1994 the County Long Range Planning Committee presented a preliminary plan for addressing County Courthouse space needs. The County hired CMK Architects of Manchester, NH to conduct a feasibility study of the options presented by the committee: renovation and construction of an addition to the courthouse or an annex as soon as funding is available. In the meantime, the Commissioners approved the state's plan for renovating the Grafton County Superior Court Office at state expense.

Once again Grafton County observed April 16-23 as County Government Week. Activities included an information booth with educational materials and county employees on hand at the Powerhouse Mall in West Lebanon, an art exhibit at the County Courthouse, and public tours of county offices. The Commissioners also recognized employees for their years of dedicated service to the county. In May a Conservation Field Day for school children was held at the Grafton County Farm, and in June the farm hosted an open house.

Financially, fiscal year 1994 was successful, in that revenues exceeded budgeted expenditures by \$738,814, due in part to the unanticipated receipt of nearly a half-a-million dollars of Medicaid Proportionate Share funds, to partially offset the cost of serving a disproportionate share of Medicaid recipients at the nursing home. Human Services costs, over which we have essentially no control, continue to rise. Savings effectuated in other departments allow us, in our FY 1995 budget, to keep our increase in revenues to be raised by taxes to 3.1%, with a total budget of \$14,818,299.

A more detailed explanation of FY 1994 is found in our annual report, copies are which are available at our office, which may be reached by calling 787-6941.

The Commissioners hold regular weekly meetings at the County Administration building on Route 10 just north of the County Courthouse in North Haverhill, with periodic tours of the Nursing Home, Department of Corrections, County Farm and Courthouse. The Commissioners also attended monthly meetings of the County Delegation's nine-member Executive Committee.

All meetings are public, with interested citizens and members of the press encouraged to attend. Call our office at the above number to confirm date, time and schedule.

Once again, we are extremely grateful to all who have helped make several successful transitions, who have worked hard for the county, and who have assisted the Commissioners - dedicated staff members, elected officials, other agency personnel, our many wonderful volunteers, and the public - all of whom have made our job easier and rewarding.

WHITE MOUNTAIN MENTAL HEALTH & DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES
DIRECTOR'S REPORT

White Mountain Mental Health and Developmental Services offers a broad array of services to the residents of Monroe. These services are offered both to individuals with developmental disabilities and to individuals and families with emotional problems or more serious mental illness.

In 1994, we are particularly proud of our adolescent program, ACUDO, which is offered in partnership with area school districts and the Division for Children, Youth and Families (DCYF). This program has successfully maintained students in our local community who would have otherwise been placed at a very costly residential treatment program.

In the area of Developmental Services, we are pleased to offer a newly expanded Early Intervention Program, which provides an array of services to families who have an infant or young child with a risk for delay, or a diagnosed developmental disability. These early services, provided in the home, often prevent very serious complications later in the child's life. Early Intervention Services can also be a "lifeline" for families, overwhelmed by the emotional and practical demands of an infant with a very serious disability.

Although it is impossible to "highlight" every program offered by our agency, we continue to provide all of our traditional programs, including psychotherapy and counseling, 24-hour emergency services, psychiatric evaluations, substance abuse counseling, and extensive services and supports to persons with a developmental disability.

During 1994, 9 Monroe residents received outpatient mental health services from our agency, for a total of 30 hours of service. This figure does not include the many services provided in addition to traditional outpatient treatment. We ask the residents of Monroe to support our efforts to keep services available to those persons in your town who are uninsured and unable to pay for their own care. In an environment of decreasing State and Federal support, your support is badly needed. Thank you.

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF MONROE,
I SUBMIT MY
EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT

On October 19, 1994 the New Hampshire State Board of Education approved the request of the Lincoln-Woodstock Cooperative School District to withdraw from School Administrative Unit 23 and form their own SAU effective July 1, 1995. In November, 1993 the Lincoln-Woodstock Cooperative School Board voted to request that the New Hampshire State Department of Education lift the moratorium on the creation of new School Administrative Units and allow them to withdraw from SAU 23 and create their own SAU. In January, 1994 the NH State Board of Education lifted the moratorium and in April voted to conditionally grant Lincoln-Woodstock's request to form their own SAU contingent upon the six remaining districts of SAU 23 developing a satisfactory proposed budget and program of services for the 1995-96 school year. A restructuring committee was formed and over the next five months board members, budget committee members and SAU administrators discussed staffing and services that should be provided by SAU 23. The financial impact of Lin-Wood's withdrawal was also discussed and this resulted in negotiations between the parties. The remaining six districts felt that it was essential that Lin-Wood assist them financially during the phase in period. This resulted in an agreement that called for the new Lin-Wood SAU (SAU 68) to employ and assume the final year of the Superintendent's contract along with all related expenses to enable the six remaining districts to employ a new Superintendent at a considerable savings. The agreement also required that the assets of the SAU (computers, furniture, etc.) be split based upon where they are located rather than based upon Lin-Wood's entitlement of 38% (85.5% of the assets were located in the Woodsville office and only 14.5% were located in the Lincoln office). Lin-Wood also agreed to surrender its right to its 38% share of the 1993-94 SAU 23 surplus of \$61,341 and to guarantee a minimum surplus of \$50,000 for 1994-95. In the event the minimum is not reached Lin-Wood will compensate SAU 23 for any shortfall. Lincoln-Woodstock also agreed to accept its share of any outstanding legal obligations as of June 30, 1995 and its share of any legal liabilities that may be brought against SAU 23, provided Lincoln-Woodstock was a member of SAU 23 at the time of the occurrence. With the

withdrawal of Lincoln-Woodstock, SAU 23 will consist of the Bath, Benton, Haverhill Cooperative, Monroe, Piermont and Warren School Districts as of July 1, 1995. The six remaining boards of SAU 23 have selected Assistant Superintendent Linda Nelson as the new Superintendent. She will assume her new responsibilities effective July 1, 1995.

This year, in order to make the transition to next year easier, district responsibilities have been split between the Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent. I am responsible for all aspects of administering the Piermont, Warren and Lincoln-Woodstock Cooperative School Districts including budget development and implementation; attending school board, budget, and school district meetings; personnel and negotiations; and curriculum and instruction. Ms. Nelson has similar responsibilities in the Bath, Monroe and Haverhill Cooperative School Districts. Benton and the School Administrative Unit are presently shared responsibilities with the Superintendent responsible for all aspects of the 1994-95 school year and Ms. Nelson, as Superintendent-elect, responsible for developing the 1995-96 budget, recommending 1995-96 staffing and planning for the 1995-96 school year.

This past year five individuals in SAU 23 received special recognition. In October Wayne Fortier, Chair of both the SAU and Haverhill Cooperative School Boards was elected President of the New Hampshire School Board Association. Bruce Labs, Woodsville High School Principal was selected as New Hampshire High School Principal of the Year. He was presented the National Distinguished Principal Award in Washington, D.C. by the National Association of Secondary Principals. Kevin Joyce of Woodsville High School was recognized last spring as the 1994 New Hampshire Secondary School Guidance Counselor of the Year and Joanne Melanson of Woodsville High was chosen as the 1994 New Hampshire FBLA Advisor of the Year. Recently Nancy McIver of Lin-Wood Middle High School was selected as the 1995 New Hampshire Consumer and Homemaking Science Teacher of the Year.

This year we would also like to recognize Robert Morey who has served as the Monroe School District Treasurer for over twenty years. Mr. Morey has decided not to run for re-election in March and will step down as

treasurer effective June 30, 1995. Mr. Morey's tenure has been one of excellence and we appreciate his commitment and dedication to the school district.

In closing I would like to thank the citizens of Monroe for your support of the Monroe Consolidated School during my tenure as Superintendent. We have made many changes including the addition and renovations to the school, developing curricula in all academic areas, utilizing technology for both educational and administrative purposes, expanding staff development activities, implementing an evaluation process for all staff and developing school board policy manuals. You have an excellent school, a dedicated faculty and staff, an accomplished principal, and a committed school board. We have all tried over the last eight years to make the Monroe Consolidated School a better place for children. I believe we have accomplished that goal and I wish you continued success in the years to come.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT AND ASSISTANT SUPERINTENDENT SALARIES

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent.

One-half of the School Administrative Unit expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the Unit on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30. The Superintendent of SAU #23 during the 1994-95 school year will receive a salary of \$73,491 prorated among the several school districts. The Assistant Superintendent will receive a salary of \$55,105 prorated among the several school districts.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL
1993-1994 SCHOOL YEAR

Back in the summer of 1992, I interviewed for the position of principal. Much to my surprise, I was offered the position. At my interviews, I was asked many questions. The three that stuck with me were:

- a. What do you consider your most important school task?

Response: To serve the community and its tax payers. To be part of the community and to take part in community school events. I believe I kept my word on this one.

- b. How do you plan to put a cap on escalating school costs?

Response: I will screen the budget often and look for ways to save money. I have saved money for the community. I have screened tuitions, I have looked for places to save on school purchases, I have looked for ways to better utilize staff, (save hiring substitutes), etc. Basically, all those money items under school control have been reduced or have remained the same. Last year, the school was able to return \$30,745 to the community.

- c. What will you do about the discipline problem at Monroe?

Response: I will evaluate the problem. I will then work with staff and community members, in an effort to resolve the situation. I evaluated the situation and found that there wasn't a discipline problem but rather a few students with behavioral difficulties. Working with school personnel, community members, and parents, I feel we have made progress and will continue to address this issue.

For the record, the Monroe School is full of talented and well-mannered students. They are being instructed by professional and caring teachers and school support staff. Without their help and understanding, we could not provide the quality educational climate that Monroe is known for.

Thanks to the school staff, the school board, the community and Monroe Students for a great three years.

REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE
SCHOOL YEAR 1993 - 1994

There were seventy-seven students, first through eight grade, who participated in the screening exams at the Monroe Clinic by Dr. Linda DeFrahm. Heights, weights, percentiles, urine for sugar and protein, and scoliosis screenings were offered along with ears, nose, throat, heart and lung screenings, with a focus on preventive medicine.

An immunization audit was done as required by the State of NH. Parents were notified (if necessary) of deficiencies as required by the state.

Hearing and vision screenings were done. There were five hearing and two vision recommendations given for referrals to their own physicians.

An in service was held in the spring at the Monroe School by Joan Lang, R.N.P., regarding allergic reactions, signs and symptoms, and how to use an eip-pen.

Kindergarten registration enrolled eleven students to the Monroe School. At registration families are requested to bring in birth certificates and immunization records. The physical form is to be sent back to school before school starts in the fall.

A notice to serve as a reminder was sent to sixth grade parents regarding the need for a MMR booster before entering seventh grade.

SAU #23 school nurses met on a regular basis to discuss health issues, as well as to develop and implement protocols and procedures. The scope ranged from infectious control, first aid, medication requirements, screenings, referrals, community awareness programs, and a health education newsletter to help promote a comprehensive school health service.

Thank you to students, parents, community and Monroe School Staff for your assistance and participation in the school health program.
