This annual report for the Town of Monroe is dedicated to Robert W. Peters.

Bob served as a Selectman for 13 years, 1950-1962, and 1969. He served as a Town Auditor for 6 years, 1962-1968. He served on the Budget Committee and other committees including the Centennial Celebration for the Town. He was an active member of the Monroe Volunteer Fire Department.

Born in Greenfield, Mass., Bob moved to Monroe around 1939 with his parents and sister. Bob graduated from McIndoes Academy, St. Johnsbury Academy and attended the University of New Hampshire. He enlisted in the U.S. Air Force on October 12, 1942 as Private; promoted to Corp. then Sgt. Airplane and Engine Mechanic; Propeller Mechanic and Instructor for 33 months at Maxton Army Air Base, N.C.; service-traveled with a mobile Training Unit throughout U.S., Oahu Island, Guam, Panama, Philippines, Okinawa, and Ie Shima; honorable discharge at Lowry Field on Dec. 15, 1945. He married Mary Louise Frazer of Monroe on June 9, 1945 and they raised a family of four children. Bob was a Mason, a member of the Monroe Grange, the Monroe Men's Club, the Methodist Church, and American Legion of Woodsville.

Bob and Mary purchased a farm and farmed for ten years in Monroe. Bob was employed by New England Power Company for 24 years with five years as Operation Supervisor at Shelburne Falls, MA. Bob joined the firm of French Pond Sand and Gravel Company in Haverhill, NH. He was the stone crusher operator known by many as Captain Crunch.

Bob enjoyed his time at his camp on Ticklenaked Pond in Ryegate, Vermont with his family. He enjoyed fishing and hunting. In the mid 1980's, Bob and Mary sold their camp and purchased a motorhome camper and traveled to many camping areas in the Northeastern States and Canada as well as Florida.

Bob would not ask anyone to do anything he wouldn't do himself, that's the kind of guy Bob was.

PROCEEDINGS OF TOWN MEETING
MARCH 14, 1995

Meeting called to order by Moderator Leslie Morrison at 7:27 P.M.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary officers for the year ensuing.

Moderator Leslie Morrison read results, declaring the winners.

ARTICLE 2. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell to the highest bidder or at public auction, excess town vehicles or any other excess equipment owned by the Town, upon such terms as the Selectmen may deem appropriate. Motion made by Bernard Bradshaw to accept as written, seconded by Merle Jones. No discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will install (2) new street lights. Larry Dunbar, Harley View Drive Pole #2/17 and Larry Dunbar Trailer (Huntoon Residence) Harley View Drive Pole #5/17. Motion made by Keith Merchand to Pass over this article, seconded by Dick Blanchard. The Moderator tells the group that there can be no discussion. A voice vote in the affirmative, this article is passed over.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to have the position of Road Agent appointed by the Selectmen, beginning in 1996. (Majority Vote required) Motion made by Bernard Bradshaw to accept as written, seconded by Keith Merchand. Bernard Bradshaw explained that this article was being brought before the people again, for a variety of reasons: insurance purposes, the on-going required training, the fact

that Butch is a Certified Water Systems Operator (if we had to hire one it would cost us "mega-bucks"), and it was stressed that this type of job should not be a "popularity" contest. If the people are dissatisfied with the Road Agent, this position can once again be brought back as an elected position by petition. No further discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to set the salary of the Tax Collector pursuant to RSA 41:33 at a fixed compensation of \$3,000. and statutory fees as included in the budget. Motion made by Thomas Bedell to accept as written, seconded by George Cobb. Discussion held, Denis Ward inquired how this cost compared to what we have previously paid? Bernie Bradshaw answered that George Hall received approximately \$2,200.00 a year and the reason this amount was set was because of the change of Tax Collector this year and that this is something we should have done previously. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to the sum of \$6,000.00 for the purpose of making repairs to the Monroe Public Library. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required) Motion made by Bernie Bradshaw to accept as read, seconded by Merle Jones. The Moderator asked for an explanation, which was given by Merle Jones. The Slectmen received 3 estimates for work to be done on the Library...including scraping, painting, entrance work, repair of some clapboards, repair of the chimney and flashing, and repair or repainting of the roof. First estimate: \$5,400.00, second estimate: \$4,900.00 and third estimate: \$11,000+ due to the fact that the Contractor felt that more needed to be done. Bernie explained that the Library was brought to their attention at the Budget Hearing. He asked the people what they wanted to see done with the Library? Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate up to the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000.00) for the purpose of beginning reappraisal of all utility property in town. The Selectmen and the Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required) Motion made to accept as written by Denis Ward, seconded by Dick Cinnamond. Bernie Bradshaw gave an explanation: many towns have had a utility appraisal done and these appraisals have held up in court and benefitted the town greatly. Utilities have in the past paid taxes on the original cost minus depreciation plus improvements. The newer methods of appraisal have the utilities paying at Fair Market Value like residents do on their homes.. This is a two year project costing \$20,000. a year. There are no guarantees, but towns have benefitted greatly. If this article is passed, there is a third part or year that will bring forth the reappraisal of private homes in town and the Utilities could request a reduction based on those reappraisals. P.J. Blanchard asked if the County Tax will go up? Bernie answered, "Yes, it could." No other discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000.00) to be added to the Highway Department Loader Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required) Motion made by Bernie Bradshaw to accept as

written, seconded by Merle Jones. Discussion held, Gerry LaFlamme asked how much was in each of these funds? Loader fund: \$42,000.00; Truck fund: \$21,000.00; Fire truck fund: \$54,322.00; and Building fund: \$67,000.00. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand dollars (\$7,000.00) to be added to the Highway Department Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established. (Majority vote required) Motion made by Merle Jones to accept as read, seconded by Robert Wormer. No discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) to be added to the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required) Motion made by Keith Merchand to accept as read, seconded by Merle Jones. No discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the municipality will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) to be added to the Municipal Highway and Fire Department Building Fund previously established and to authorize the use/transfer of the December 31, 1994 fund balance in that amount for this purpose. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required) Motion made by Helen Clement to accept as read, seconded by Dick Cinnamon. Denis Ward asked if there was a report from the committee? Gerry LaFlamme explained that they had looked at various sites, ruling out several for various reasons, they have also looked into salt and sand sheds finding that the prices can go as high as \$60,000. to \$80,000. They continue to work on designs as well a State of N.H. requirements. Denis Ward inquired, "What will it cost in maintenance and per mile of road, also had the Selectmen ever considered hiring a private contractor to do this work instead of having a Town Crew?" The costs have not been figured and as of now the hiring of private contractors had not been considered by the Selectmen. No more discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the municipality will vote to create an expendable general fund trust under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, to be known as the Town History Fund, for the purpose of preparing, updating, and publishing the History of Monroe, N.H. and to raise and appropriate the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) to be placed in this fund and authorize the use/transfer of the December 31, 1994 fund balance in the amount for this purpose and designate the Slectmen as agents to expend said fund. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority vote required) Motion made by George Cobb to accept as read, seconded by Merle Jones. Helen Clement inquired whether this was for updating the Monroe History? Merle Jones explained that the Monroe History not been updated since 1955 and that this would enable the Town to set aside a sum of money each year for the next 5 or 6 years in order to be able to publish an updated version in possibly the year 2000 or 2001. The sum of aproximately \$10,000.00 had been suggested, so that is the sum they are looking at to raise. No further discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 13. To hear all reports of committees and Officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto. Bernard Bradshaw informed the group of a letter from Senator Ned Gordon, District 2, regarding the Glencliff Home. This letter requested the town to pass a resolution to help raise funds for \$7.5 Million for necessary repairs and building. Mr. Bradshaw read the resolution. Bernie Bradshaw made the motion that we accept this motion as read, seconded by Merle Jones. Fred Rothe asked how many people were housed there? 102. Denis Ward asked how many people were employed there? 181. Don Hall wanted to know whether they were planning on tearing down buildings and rebuilding or what were the plans? The specifics were not known. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, resolution passed. Motion made by Helen Clement to accept the reports as written, seconded by Mary Jo Locke. No discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 14. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same. Motion made by Bernard Bradshaw to raise \$486,516.95, seconded by Merle Jones. Bernie explained that this sum includes all of the articles, except articles 11 & 12 which are money taken from Fund Balances. The budget is actually \$12,000.00 less than printed in Budget, because that \$12,000.00 comes out of the Fund Balance. No further discussion. Voice vote in the affirmative, motion passes, article passed.

ARTICLE 15. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Robert Wormer presented plaques to:

- George Hall (Phillip G.) for 18 years as Tax Collector
- Joyce Cate for 17 years as Town Treasurer
- Bernard Bradshaw for 21 years as Selectman

All three were given a round of applause to thank them for their dedication and service to the Town. Mr. Bradshaw thanked the people and told them that his years as Selectman had "Definitely been an education".

Any other business?

The Moderator reminded all elected officials that they needed to be sworn in to office and should try to be at Town Hall at 7:30 P.M. on Tuesday March 21, 1995, at which time the Town Clerk would swear them in. Anyone who could not be there needed to make arrangements with the Town Clerk to do so at another time.

The Moderator informed the people that there would be refreshments in the Town Hall dining room immediately after the meeting to wish the outgoing officials well.

Helen Clement made the motion to adjourn this meeting, seconded by Mary Jo Locke. Meeting adjourned at 8:10 P.M..

**INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT
ON FINANCIAL PRESENTATION**

To The Members of the Board of Selectmen
Town of Monroe
Monroe, N.H. 03771

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements and the combining and individual fund financial statements of the Town of Monroe, New Hampshire as of, and for the year ended December 31, 1994, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Town's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion of these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

As is the practice with many New Hampshire municipalities, the Town of Monroe, New Hampshire has not maintained a record of its general fixed assets and, accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in the financial report.

The Water Fund is reported as Special Revenue Fund, whereas generally accepted accounting principles require that it be reported as an Enterprise Fund.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the third paragraph and except as noted in the fourth paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Town of Monroe, New Hampshire as of December 31, 1994, and the results of its operations and cash flows of its similar trust fund types for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Also, in our opinion, the combining and individual fund financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of each of the individual funds of the Town of Monroe, New Hampshire as of December 31, 1994 and the results of operations of such funds and the cash flows of nonexpendable trust funds for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

AUDITORS ' REPORT---CONTINUED

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole and on the combining and individual fund financial statements. The accompanying financial information listed as the supplemental schedule in the table of contents is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements of the Town of Monroe, New Hampshire. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose, combining, and individual fund financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in each of the respective individual funds taken as a whole.

01-01-95 to 12-31-95

The Monroe F.A.S.T. Squad responded to 33 calls in 1995, compared to 21 the previous year. These calls can be broken down into the following categories:

- 20 Medical Emergencies
- 10 Trauma
- 2 Motor Vehicle Accidents
- 1 Assist to Fire Department

In March of 1995, Six squad members passed the National Registry written and practical examinations to become EMERGENCY MEDICAL TECHICIANS (EMT'S). Eight of our 13 members are now certified EMT'S. This advanced training was funded entirely through contributions made to the squad by local businesses who responded to our request for financial assistance.

The upcoming year will see the recertification of members trained at the First Responder level, as their three year provider licenses will expire at the end of 1996. In addition, all squad members will renew their 2 year certification in CPR by the end of the year.

We appreciate the support we've received from individuals and businesses in the town of Monroe. Participation in our fund raising activities (dances, hunter's breakfast, Monroe Days food stand, etc.) has been terrific, and has allowed us to maintain and even expand our qualifications without impacting taxes. Thank you for your continued interest and for all the well wishes. They confirm our belief that our service is an asset to the community.

REPORT OF THE TOWN FOREST WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

In calendar year 1995, our three (3) leading causes of fires were Children, Non-Permit fires not properly extinguished and Smoking Materials.

Violations of RSA 224:27 II, the fire permit law and the other burning laws of the State of New Hampshire, are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2,000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs.

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department and State Forest Fire Officials, contact your local Warden or Fire Department to find out if a permit is required. This also helps to prevent unnecessary response to a controlled burn.

With the arrival of 1996 comes North Country Home Health Agency's 25th Anniversary providing home health care services to residents of Monroe and surrounding communities. The Board of Directors are proud of the commitment of its experienced and qualified staff. NCHHA provides North Country residents with acute home care services (as a continuum of care or as an alternative to hospital care) and long term care (as an alternative to institutional placement).

In July, 1995, after months of preparation and with overwhelming community support, NCHHA moved its Littleton facility and administrative headquarters into the renovated Littleton Christian School property at 536 Cottage Street. This new space gives NCHHA efficient space for staff, as well as wonderful classroom space for continuing education programs.

The Medicare Certified Hospice Program continues to work in close collaboration with the volunteers from to provide a comprehensive plan of care and support for individuals with a terminal illness and their families. Twelve (12) clients and their families received expanded Medicare benefits from the certified hospice program at NCHHA during 1995.

During 1995, 734 homecare clients in northern Grafton and southern Coos Counties received 42,668 home visits from NCHHA staff. In the Town of Monroe, 26 residents received 1345 home care visits as follows:

More than 800 individuals received care at agency sponsored influenza immunization, blood pressure, blood sugar and foot care clinics.

There are 70-80 professional, paraprofessional and trained staff employed at NCHHA, representing 45-50 full time equivalent employees.

We look forward to continuing to earn your confidence as the home care provider and visiting nurse organization in Monroe during 1996 and long into the future.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL 1995 ANNUAL REPORT

This last year has been a year of great growth for the Council. The high point of the year came with North Country Council's move to the new regional resource center on November 1. The center will provide expanded information, data and resources. It will bring together under one roof, public technical assistance providers, businesses and non-profits for regional advocacy and partnership. The new center, located at the Rocks Estate in Bethlehem, offers conference facilities, electronic network connections and technical assistance.

It has also been a very productive year for the regional transportation planning program. We have undertaken a scenic byway project in the Connecticut River Valley involving 13 towns, and will in the near future expand this effort to the remaining 38 towns in the region. We have also completed a list of projects to be included in the state ten-year highway plan. We have completed the North Country program for transportation enhancement funding and have been active in transportation projects at the local and regional level.

We have had a successful public works development program this year. Littleton's industrial development project and Conway's sewer project are underway. We have started the work to fund a sewer expansion project in Haverhill and a water development project in Berlin. The total of these 4 projects exceeds \$6.5 million. In addition, we have provided detailed engineering assistance and leadership on 16 additional projects across the region totaling \$10 million.

The Council hosted the third annual Ingenuity Fair which exhibited the manufacturing and business creativity of the North Country to 10,000 visitors. We also conducted our fourth annual business survey of the 3000+ businesses in the region. We have been working on the development of a regional commercial kitchen with the town of Lancaster and the state Rural Development Council. We also have updated the NCC industrial marketing video with support and assistance from DRED and Fleet Bank.

The Council continues to be actively involved in telecommunications, from a legislative and coordinative role. In addition, we have been participating in a variety of statewide forums to make sure our telecommunication needs as a region are being heard.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL, INC. REPORT--Continued

Recognizing that adequate and affordable health care is an essential component of the region's economic infrastructure, the Council is committed to supporting and facilitating regional efforts to improve the coordination and delivery of health care services. Our involvement has been prompted by our work with CHOICE, Inc., a non-profit education and cost containment organization that is affiliated with the NHMA. In that same period of time, we've been meeting with local health care providers to get their views on the region's health care practices, problems, and potential solutions.

On the solid waste front, the Council is providing solid waste technical assistance to all member towns on solid waste and recycling issues.

We have continued our commitment to community planning assistance. We have provided 4 training sessions in the region for local planning boards. We have also provided project assistance to 17 towns on local land use, planning and design issues and have worked with virtually every town in the region to answer short-term planning questions.

North Country Council is participating in a national demonstration highway planning corridor project with three other regional planning commissions along Route 16 under the auspices of the NH Department of Transportation. Our segment of this project involves approximately 90 miles of Route 16 beginning at the southern end of the Mt. Washington Valley and ending in Wentworth Location. The project involves an intensive land use and transportation assessment and will be both GIS and data base formatted. The public participation process has been designed to involve all the communities along the corridor to develop innovative land use and traffic management recommendations.

This coming year promises to build on the progress of 1995. We will see the growth and development of the regional center, the establishment of a business resource library and a community design center in cooperation with several major universities. On behalf of the Board of Directors of NCC, we thank you for your involvement in the Council and we look forward to serving you in 1996.

GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS'
REPORT FOR 1995

The Grafton County Board of Commissioners is pleased to present the following reports and financial statements. We hope they will increase your understanding of Grafton County's finances and operations and assure citizens that their County tax dollars have been expended wisely.

During FY 1995, funds received exceeded the budget by \$163,615.52 for a total of \$14,981,914.52 in actual County revenues. This was primarily due to the receipt of Medicaid Proportionate Share Payment, given by the Federal Government to partially offset the cost of serving a disproportionate share of Medicaid recipients at the County Nursing Home.

Actual expenditures totaled \$14,598,041.22 which was \$220,257.78 less than had been budgeted. This includes \$378,525 paid to the State of New Hampshire to enable the County to receive \$757,050 in Medicaid Proportionate Share Payment, for a net receipt of \$378,525 which was used by the County to start a Nursing Home Capital Reserve Account in the amount of \$200,000 and the balance going to surplus to help reduce the amount to be raised by County taxes. Expenditures for Medical Referee, Dispatch Center, Grafton County Conservation District, and Outside Counsel were all a little overexpended based on what was budgeted, but all other County departments were well under their budgeted amounts.

The bottom line for FY 1995 showed that revenues exceeded expenditures by \$383,873.30 leaving the County in a sound financial position at the end of its fiscal year. The Commissioners feel extremely proud of this financial picture, which exemplifies good management by all County department heads, both elected and appointed.

Grafton County experienced some major changes during FY 1995, some of which were the retirement of Douglas "Bum" Bigelow who served the County with forty-four years of dedicated, loyal service. The Commissioners would also like to take the opportunity to thank former Commissioner Betty Jo Taffe for her years of dedicated service to the citizens and employees of Grafton County. The Commissioners would also like to extend their thanks to Joanne Mann for doing an excellent job as Acting Administrator of the Nursing Home through November of 1994. At that time, Mr. John Will came on board as the Nursing Home Administrator, and we would like to welcome Mr. Will and inform you he has done a superb job thus far. Last but not least, we would like to welcome our newest Commissioner, Mr. Steve Panagoulis, Vice-Chairman, Grafton County Board of Commissioners, District 3. Commissioner Panagoulis brings a great deal of knowledge and sound judgment to the Board, and has shown those qualities since January, 1995. We feel Commissioner Panagoulis is a great asset to the citizens and employees of Grafton County.

FY 1995 was another busy year for the Department of Corrections. Admissions were up, although inmate days decreased slightly. The Electronic Monitoring Program continues to grow, and appears to be an excellent form of alternative sentencing, and now has expanded to include the Drug Freedom Program which is funded through a grant from the Attorney General's Office. Superintendent Bird continues utilizing many volunteers for a number of in-house programs.

The Grafton County Nursing Home has seen changes during the past year in the following areas: computer hardware upgrade, and adding a new part-time dietary aide to help serve meals. In May, Cheryl Ridley, RN, became our new Director of Nursing, our census continues to grow, and our Staff Development Coordinator has implemented a "Quality Assurance" program in-house.

GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS' REPORT--Continued

The Commissioners are extremely proud of the Whole Village Family Resource Center project, which continues on track, and hopefully will be completed by the end of the next fiscal year. We are certain it will benefit many citizens and their families in Southeastern Grafton County.

All other County departments were extremely busy during FY 1995. The County Treasurer did an excellent job investing County funds, and exceeded the budgeted interest revenue figure by \$55,177.78. The new County Attorney has done an excellent job in his office, and the number of backlog cases has been reduced drastically. Our Sheriff's Department and Dispatch Center continue to increase with activity, and remain as effective and efficient as always. Carol Elliott, Register of Deeds, and her staff also continue to be overwhelmed with work, and continue to do an excellent job and to generate a great deal of revenue for the County and the State of New Hampshire.

For FY 1995, the Commissioners concluded with preparation of the FY 1996 County Budget, which was adopted by the County Legislative Delegation in late June.

The Grafton County Board of Commissioners holds regular weekly meetings at the County Administration Building on Route 10 just north of the County Courthouse in North Haverhill, with periodic tours of the Nursing Home, Department of Corrections, County Farm, and Courthouse. The Commissioners also attend monthly meetings of the Grafton County Executive Committee. All meetings are public, with interested citizens and members of the press encouraged to attend. In closing, we wish to express our appreciation to all staff members, elected officials, other agency personnel, and the public for their efforts in serving the citizens of Grafton County.

WHITE MOUNTAIN MENTAL HEALTH
AND
DEVELOPMENTAL SERVICES
DIRECTOR'S REPORT

1995-96 has been a challenging year for all healthcare providers, and WMMH&DS has not been exempt from the many pressures currently being exerted upon our field. Our outpatient mental health programs have been working to continue to provide high quality care in an environment in which brief focused interventions have become essential. This new attention to "managing Care" has meant that many people who were previously covered by health insurance for our services now find themselves uninsured or underinsured. In spite of this difficult reality, we have continued to serve outpatients from locations in Littleton, Lincoln, Lancaster, Woodsville and Warren. MAINTAINING THIS VARIETY OF SITES IS COSTLY, BUT WE ARE ACUTELY AWARE OF THE PREFERENCE OF LOCAL COMMUNITIES TO HAVE MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES AVAILABLE LOCALLY. This year we have focused particularly on the needs of children and elders. We now offer an array of services to both of these populations. During 1995, based on feedback from the communities we serve, we have added staff in both of these programs. AS A RESULT, of these efforts, we are now able to offer the following:

SERVICES TO CHILDREN AND FAMILIES:

- *COMPREHENSIVE ASSESSMENTS OF CHILDREN AND FAMILIES, INCLUDING:
 - Psychological Testing by a Ph.D Clinical Psychologist;
 - Substance Abuse Assessment by Certified Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counselor;
 - Clinical Assessment by a team of experienced clinicians including a Board Certified Psychiatrist;
 - Medication Evaluation if indicated;
 - Vocational Assessment if indicated in the case of adolescent referrals;
- *ANGER MANAGEMENT through participation in a specially developed Martial Arts curriculum designed and led by an experienced clinician and Martial Arts instructor;
- *INTENSIVE EXPERIENTIAL PROGRAM (3 hours per day) for adolescents with severe behavioral and emotional problems;
- *IN-SCHOOL SUPPORTS for children with severe emotional and behavioral problems;
- *IDENTIFICATION AND COORDINATION of the network of services available to the family;
- *FAMILY THERAPY:
- *PLAY THERAPY:
- *ASSESSMENT AND TREATMENT OF ATTENTIONAL DISORDERS.
Including medication recommendations when appropriate.

SERVICES TO ELDERS;

- *Information, Referral and Support to Families;
- *Home-Based Screening and Assessment;
- *Case Management and Coordination of available Community Services;
- *Crisis Intervention;
- Medication and Medication Management;
- *Consultation to three area nursing homes.

White Mountain Mental Health---Continued

In addition to thses recently augmented programs, we continue to offer all the other programs the community has grown to expect from our organization. These include:

- * 24-hour Emergency Services;
- *Case Management, Housing, Medication and Vocational Services to persons with severe and persistent mental illness;
- *Common Ground--extensive, individualized supports and vocational placements to persons with developmental disabilities;
- *Early Intervention services for infants and toddlers;
- *The Recovery Connection--substance abuse and treatment.

In an era of shrinking state and federal support, we are subsidized to provide treatment only to the most severely mentally ill individuals in the community. We look to you to help support our services to the many other children, families and elders who look to us for care.

In 1995, 13 Residents of Monroe received \$7,840 of care. These people were either uninsured or underinsured, and were not able to pay the full cost of services. As a result, White Mountain Mental Health and Developmental Services subsidized these services. We look to you, the community, to make a contribution to assist us in continuing this subsidy.

I continue to be amazed at how the numbers of emergencies and disasters handled by our small staff and dedicated volunteers continues to increase, year after year. In spite of ongoing education and awareness, when the disaster actually strikes, the lives of our friends and neighbors come to a screeching halt. I think the following examples tell the Red Cross Story.

When fire strikes a neighbor and the family is faced with the loss of everything they own, you can rely on the Red Cross to be on the scene when they are asked to be.

For service members overseas with families here at home, the Red Cross is their communication link in times of an emergency.

Teaching people what to do in an emergency is a vital part of the Red Cross Mission and last year over 10,000 of our neighbors attended classes that helped them prepare for emergencies. Perhaps you read the story recently about the north country judge who was able to perform CPR on a visitor in his courtroom because of the Red Cross training he had received. It is incumbent upon all of us to be prepared, because when emergencies strike, help can't wait.

The Red Cross has also made huge investments in the last three years to guarantee the safety of the blood supply required by our hospitals. Together with the unselfish generosity of hundreds of blood donors who attend blood drives every year, this vital Red Cross Service helps people whose lives may be in jeopardy without it.

While the work performed by the Red Cross at national disaster sites receives more attention the work we do here at home is often less obvious. Every day, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year, the American Red Cross is available to help citizens in your community and throughout the 3000 mile area that we cover.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Monroe, in the county of Grafton in said state, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at Monroe Town Hall in said Monroe on Tuesday, the 12th (Twelfth) day of March, next at 7:00 of the clock in the P.M. to act upon the following subjects: With the School business preceding Town business meeting:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. (By Ballot)
2. To see what action the Town will take concerning plowing driveways.
3. Shall the voters of the Town of Monroe vote not to renew the annual contract with Cottage Hospital for the use of our (Monroe) Clinic Building. (By Petition)
4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen indefinitely to sell to the highest bidder or at public auction excess town vehicles or any other excess equipment owned by the Town, upon such terms as the Selectmen may deem appropriate. This authorization will remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the municipal meeting. (Majority Vote Required).
5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen indefinitely to convey any real estate acquired by the Town by Tax Collector's deed. Such conveyance shall be by deed following a public auction, or the property may be sold by advertised sealed bids, or may be otherwise disposed of as justice may require, pursuant to RSA 80:58-86. This authorization will remain in effect until rescinded by a vote of the municipal meeting. (Majority Vote Required).
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of thirty-seven hundred dollars (\$ 3,700.00) for the purpose of making exterior repairs and painting the Monroe Public Library. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority Vote Required).
7. To see if the Town will vote to set the salaries of the members of the Board of Selectmen at \$ 1,500.00 each per year. Budget Committee recommends this salary. (Majority Vote Required).
8. To see if the Town will vote to set the salary of the Tax Collector pursuant to RSA 41:33 at a fixed compensation of \$ 4,000.00 plus statutory fees as included in the budget. (Majority Vote Required).
9. To see if the Town will vote to change the Tax Collector term from one year to three years, beginning with the term in 1997. (Majority Vote Required)
10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$ 20,000.00) for phase II of reappraisal of all utility property in town.

The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority Vote Required).

11. To see if the Town will vote to create an expendable general Trust Fund under the provisions of RSA 31:19-a, to be known as the Monroe Water Department Maintenance Fund for the purposes of repairing and maintaining the Monroe Water Department storage tank, to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$ 10,000) to be placed in this Fund and to designate the Selectmen as agents to expend said Fund. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority Vote Required).
12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seventy-five hundred dollars (\$7,500.00) for a new heating system to be installed at the Monroe Clinic. The Selectmen recommend this appropriation and the Budget Committee does not recommend this appropriation. (Majority Vote Required).
13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand dollars (\$ 7,000.00) to be added to the Highway Department Loader Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority Vote Required).
14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$ 10,000.00) to be added to the Highway Department Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority Vote Required).
15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of fifteen thousand dollars (\$ 15,000.00) to be added to the Fire Truck Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority Vote Required).
16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$ 20,000.00) to be added to the Municipal Highway and Fire Department Building Capital Reserve Fund previously established. The Selectmen and Budget Committee recommend this appropriation. (Majority Vote Required).

 2. Maximum spending limits per election linked to geographic and demographic makeup of each state and district, such as \$ 1.00 per vote;
 3. Sharp limitation on all forms of spending to influence elections, including independent expenditures;
 4. Sharp limitations on contributions to spending by political action committees; and
 5. Remedies, such as free broadcast time, postal subsidies, and democratic (public) financing, to balance inequities between credible candidates, incumbent and challenger, rich and poor.
22. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations for the same.
23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Action on all remaining articles to commence at 7:00 o'clock in the afternoon.

- ARTICLE 1: To choose, by non-partisan ballot, a Moderator for the ensuing year.
- ARTICLE 2: To choose, by non-partisan ballot, a School District Clerk for the ensuing year.
- ARTICLE 3: To choose, by non-partisan ballot, a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
- ARTICLE 4: To choose, by non-partisan ballot, two School Board Members for a term of three years.
- ARTICLE 5: To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
- ARTICLE 6: To see if the school district will vote to create an expendable general fund trust fund under the provisions of RSA 198:20-c, to be known as the special education expendable trust fund, for the purpose of educating educationally handicapped children. Report of the Superintendent's and Business Administrator's Salaries

Section 5, Chapter 243, Laws of 1953 of the State of New Hampshire requires that school district annual reports show the total amount paid to the Superintendent and Business Administrator.

One-half of the School Administrative Unit expenses is prorated among the several school districts of the Unit on the basis of adjusted valuation. One-half is prorated on the basis of average daily membership in the schools for the previous school year ending June 30. The Superintendent of SAU #23 during the 1995-96 school year will receive a salary of \$59,000.00 plus and incentive of \$2,100.00 prorated among the several school districts. The Business Administrator will receive a salary of \$36,000.00 plus and incentive of \$1,000.00 prorated among the several school districts.

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD AND CITIZENS OF MONROE,
I SUBMIT MY FIRST ANNUAL REPORT

In October, 1994, the New Hampshire State Board of Education granted SAU #23's request to form two SAUs: SAU 23, consisting of Bath, Benton, Haverhill Cooperative, Monroe, Piermont and Warren; and SAU 68, Lincoln-Woodstock. This reorganization was discussed in last year's Town Report.

At the SAU 23 Board meeting in May, Wayne Fortier stepped down as Chair, thanking the Board for its support during his three years in office. He explained that his work as President of the New Hampshire State School Boards Association and Chair of the state's Joint Education Council made this necessary. After thanking Fortier for his leadership during the difficult SAU separation process, the Board elected Denis Ward of Monroe as Chair. Ben Harrington of Bath was elected Vice Chair. Bob Regis of Monroe became Secretary, and Donna Roche of Haverhill became Treasurer. As he does in Monroe, Denis brings a high level of insight about board issues to the SAU Chairmanship.

With SAU Board approval, we added a Business Administrator to the SAU staff, hiring Ed Emond for this position in July, 1995. Ed is a strong addition to the SAU and has earned our respect for his work developing the SAU and district budgets.

The Monroe school community said goodbye to Principal Carl Nolin, wishing him well in his new principalship in Nashua. He is missed. His last work over the summer of 1995 was the completion of a number of building improvements: new carpeting and curtains in the library, new blinds for the cafeteria and administrative offices, and some painting and carpentry improvements.

A school community committee selected Fred Rubinfeld as the new Principal. Beginning his work in August, 1995, Fred has made a successful transition to Monroe, starting with a faculty-new principal cook-out in the summer which resulted

in a draft Mission Statement for the school. The Mission Statement has been shared with students and the community and continues to be refined as various groups come together to discuss it.

The Monroe Village School faculty also said goodbye to Priscilla Ledwith, long time music teacher, when she retired at the end of the school year. Susan Persson was hired for this position and has expanded the instrumental music program while continuing the choral work. The halls of Monroe now ring with the music of their growing number of student musicians. Ms. Persson held a particularly popular Christmas program, including local community musicians in the instrumental and choral music program. The instrumental music program has grown so rapidly that the School Board has added an extra day a week of music instruction to accommodate student interest.

Other school community committees continue to meet periodically. The scheduling committee tried block scheduling in 1994-95, but returned to a more traditional schedule in 1995-96 in order to fit in special programs and planning for the staff. Scheduling will continue to be looked at for the 1996-97 year. The Middle School Program continues to be scrutinized, with parents and faculty together looking for ways to make the middle school experience as positive a one as the elementary classes are for students. As always, the faculty and staff maintain the high level of professionalism that the Monroe Community expects from its school personnel.

Finally, I would like to thank the Monroe school community for your kind support. The first few months as Superintendent have been very busy. I am continually surprised by the range of responsibilities that come with this job. I welcome hearing your thoughts about school issues. *SAU 23 Notes*, published monthly, is an attempt to keep you informed about our work. The SAU #23 School Community Forums, which have featured Dr. Jack Hruska on Family-School Connections, and Fred Bramante on Market Driven Teacher Compensation Plans, are another way we

are trying to include the community in our work.

As you know, we can only reach our primary goal - making school a challenging and enriching experience for all students - by working together. It's a goal that we can reach, together.

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REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE
SCHOOL YEAR 1994 - 1995

The school year 1994-95 began with seventy students participating in screenings at the Monroe Clinic by Dr. Linda DeFrahn. As regularly done by the school nurse are heights, weights, percentiles, urine for sugar and protein. At the Monroe Clinic scoliosis, ears, nose, throat, heart and lung assessments are part of the screening with a focus on preventive medicine and health education. Recommendations for follow-up with student's own physician on any screening not within normal limits are done. Dr. Linda DeFrahn does not use these screenings in place of regular physicals by the students own doctor.

Immunization audit was completed and reported to the State Immunization Department. Parents were notified if updating on immunizations for their child was needed. All students entering seventh grade in the state of New Hampshire are required to have had a secondary measles shot.

At Kindergarten registration eleven students were enrolled. Birth certificate and immunization record are needed at registration time. Emergency telephone cards are completed that day and the physical form given out needs to be returned to the school before the first day in the fall.

Inservices on medical care plans were held. We also had a guest speaker, Margaret Wilson, RN speak on anaphylaxis.

SAU #23 school nurses met on a rotating bases at the Monroe School. School health issues and protocols are discussed. These meetings are informative, provide support, and promote a comprehensive school health service.

The hearing and vision screenings were performed. There was one hearing referral and three vision referrals.

A special thank-you to the support staff for their excellent care of and contribution to the health and welfare needs of the students on a daily basis. Also to students, parents, teachers and community members a heart filled thank-you for your assistance, support and participation in the school health program.
